
The highlight for me was the farm open day which was very well attended. The staff had obviously gone to a lot of bother to prepare exhibits and give rides. (see p5).

Lacey Green Windmill



WINDMILL

On the farm

On June 11th we opened our gate for Open Farm Sunday, along with 250 other farms around the U.K., five years after the last time. Open Farm Sunday is organised by Leaf (Linking Environment and Farming). It is thought 170,000 people visited a farm on June 11th this year. We think around 400 of them visited Stocken Farm; we hope they found their visit rewarding.

For the weeks running up to the big day we wondered why we had decided to do it, there is a lot of preparation tidying up, setting up, doing risk assessments, persuading all the helpers that this is how they want to spend their Sunday! This was a free event, and all the displays of machinery and other displays were done by farming friends and family, with the only reward being of feeling the farming industry and its consumers had become a little closer together. We had many interesting questions from you, about cows, crops, hedge row management etc. and a surprising number asking if we sell unpasteurised milk direct to the public (the answer is no). These are good questions for us as it makes us look at our industry from a different angle. Our staff enjoyed the opportunity to showcase the stock they tend day in, day out; also being able to explain why we may be combining near your house late on a Sunday night or on the road with our equipment holding the traffic up. It's not just for fun but trying to do an operation which is all part of the ultimate aim of farming which is to produce good quality food, which is still very popular. Hopefully making a profit on the way.

Arla, our milk cooperative sent us out a pallet of Arla products for visitors to sample, which three members of their staff came down to hand out. They came from down Leeds and London, volunteering their own time. Phil Hunter, a keen metal detectorist for many decades, came to display his finds that he has found in the local area; fascinating history found in the

fields around us. Fiona, another local farmer, brought her beehives (without bees) to demonstrate how apiculture works; her husband lan provided the tractor and trailer rides all day, which were constantly in demand. Princes Risborough Young Farmers also ran a barbeque, and helped run the day, a hig workforce the

the day, a big workforce that also gave their day up in the interest of farming.

In June, Ian our herdsman for over 25 years, decided to hang up the clusters for the last time. We thank him for his dedication to our cows and business, and wish him well in the future. Over his time the business has changed quite dramatically; cow numbers have risen and milk yields per cow have gone up by nearly 50%. Expectations in milk quality have risen and the pressures of farming have changed. Nowadays numerous people come to the farm with clipboards making sure we do everything to their standard. Availability of skilled farm staff is becoming an ever-increasing issue for our industry. Farmers are looking at all sorts of technical solutions like robotic milking, these will help but won't remove the need for skilled agricultural staff. It is often a career not promoted at school age, but it is worth considering. We are increasingly operating with part time employees.

our wheat harvest. So far, the crops look in good condition, so finders crossed they deliver a good yield and are up to milling quality. Since we planted the wheat, the value per tonne has gone from around £200/ton to £350/ton, it has now dropped back £170/ton for harvest movement. It is so difficult to predict which direction the price will go from there. We have made our grass silage, and whole crop rye and barley.

In early August we expect to start



will be the maize in September. It's been a difficult spring to establish maize, with constant wet in March and April and much of May, changing rapidly to baking dry in June. We have approximately 20 acres of maize planted at the end of May which only germinated in July as it went dry straight after planting, this will probably come to nothing much.

While the cows are out during summer, we have been improving our cow housing, which is proving to be very time consuming, but will be good by the time the cows are housed.

In May we had some reactors when we were TB testing. This means we can not sell any cattle to other farmers until we have two clear tests. Our next test will be around the beginning of August.

So, with harvest upon us and many more agricultural vehicles on the road, when you get behind a tractor and trailer or combine on the road, please be patient, and remember we are working to keep your fridge and larder full!






My name is Joan West and local history research is my passion. For over 50 years I have enjoyed investigating local history and putting it together like a jigsaw. It is an ever-evolving picture.... And growing media wiki! Rather than keep it all to myself I wanted to share with others, who I hope will be as curious and intrigued as I have been.

In this wiki, local people, places and events are recorded and linked so that it is possible to trace back through their stories.

For me it all began in 1971 when I hoped to discover the history of Stocken Farm, my husband's family home. Dennis Claydon was already working on the local history here. In 2008 the Local History Group was formed when Dennis Claydon and I declined to write a local book knowing that once printed it could not include any new information that came to light. It was decided to put that information on a website.

What is this life if, full of care, we have no time to stand and stare.



Rematching a New Family

Mel and Sue Webster of Loosley Row were used to sharing their home with friends and family but when the war in Ukraine broke out, they made the decision to host not just one Ukrainian family but two.

"As a couple, we're very used to having a full house." laughs Mel. "For nearly 2 decades, we have lived as a multi-generational family, living under the same roof as our daughter and son-in-law and their now grown up children. It's certainly kept us young and

Despite being retired and already having a full house, the couple sat down with the whole family to discuss the possibility of hosting a Ukrainian family looking for a safe place to live.

"I suppose our decision to sponsor a Ukrainian family was prompted initially by the UK government setting up the Homes For Ukraine scheme, which enables households to provide accommodation for Ukrainians in return for £350 monthly payment." (This has since increased to £500.)

"However we were also moved by the amazing response of our little village, which set up its own community group, the Ukraine2chilterns charity, in support of the Homes for Ukraine scheme.

Having spent his career as a mechanical and electrical engineer, Mel had years of experience redesigning commercial spaces and had even used his skills in retirement to expand the premises of the family's hearing aid business. With the decision to host now made. Mel turned his attention for the first time on the potential of the couple's own home as a safe place to live for refugees. "I could see with a bit of creativity that I could create a self-contained space for a small family.

I distinctly remember the day that the visas for our Ukrainian family

finally came through. Our Ukrainian family rang to say that they were driving by car through Europe, and were due to arrive in just 4 days' time. This meant that I suddenly had to crack on with the job of making my vision of a space for our guests real in record time!" says Mel. "The day that Erhan. Natália, Sasha 5 yrs and Melissa 2 yrs arrived was really emotional," recounts Mel. "They were exhausted."

After six months of living with the Websters, with his leg now fully mended, Erhan and his family decided to return to a safer part of Ukraine to run the family business they had left behind.

But within a few days of their departure, Mel and Sue began to hear of another Ukrainian family this time however, a family already living in Buckinghamshire that faced being uprooted yet again as they were nearing the end of their six month stay.

The Homes for Ukraine scheme was initially set up to offer Ukrainians a safe place to live for a period of 6 months but with the war continuing for so much longer than anticipated, the reality is that dozens of families now need re-matching with another local host family or face homelessness.

"Our local Council Liaison Officer explained to us that by agreeing to be a rematching sponsor for Alina and her two young children, Sofiia 9 yrs and Marianna 4 yrs, the young family could continue to stay within the local area where they had begun to rebuild their lives. Alina could keep her job as a cook in the local primary school, and importantly the children could remain in their local schools."

"Being a rematching sponsor was a much easier experience for us as all the work required to settle the family into the local community such as finding jobs, getting the children in to school, registering with GPs had already been done. For us, this meant we could just enjoy getting to know

Alina and her two young children," says Sue.

"Alina and the children have settled in wonderfully, becoming not just close friends but a real part of our family," continues Mel.

"Although they have their own separate accommodation, we genuinely share our daily lives with each other. When Alina goes off to work in the morning, I love taking Sophiia to school every day and then picking her up in the afternoon. We chat all the way so her English is improving so quickly!

It has been a real privilege to see her blossom and grow in confidence. She's just like my own granddaughter - in fact I'm teaching her to play the piano, iust as I did for all my other grandchildren. As for Alina, she is an amazing cook and is always popping in to offer us the most delicious Ukrainian dishes, although I have to say that she is also picking up British cuisine pretty quickly too. She particularly adores Mary Berry's cook books and makes the most amazing chocolate ganache.

I know for many of my generation, starting again with another young family may seem like a big commitment, but actually it's been great for the whole family.

I'd really recommend becoming a rematching sponsor. It has strengthened our links to our local community in so many ways. It's also opened our eyes to an entirely new culture that is utterly fascinating and of course, we absolutely adore being grandparents to our Ukrainian grand-daughters."

We continue to encourage community groups to participate in the North West Chilterns Community Board and take advantage of the available funds to carry out projects.

Proud of Bucks Award

Mr Leigh Axe (resident of Lacey Green) was nominated for a Proud of Bucks Award in the category of Local Community Champion. Although he was not the winner, he was highly commended for working tirelessly for the older and younger members of the community in Lacey Green. (see p21 Ed)

Traffic calming

The petition on traffic calming measures in Lacey Green, in particular the stretch of New Road from Walters Ash to Lacey Green and Main Road around St John's School, ran until the 11th May. This has garnered a great deal of public interest in the form of 330 signatures.

We support the main aims of the petition to continue the 40MPH speed limit from RAF High Wycombe on New Road to Lacey Green, with the 30 MPH pushed further along New Road towards Walters Ash to enable vehicles to safely slow before the bend. We also support the call for a zebra crossing being installed to connect the church to School to make it safer for children during school hours.

This report while originally due for consideration at the Community Board meeting on the 27th July will now, due to technical reasons, be considered in a separate meeting in September.

Action on potholes

Bucks Council are focused on tackling the increased number of potholes and road defects this year, caused by the very wet and cold winter. The team have reached the milestone of completing 10,000 repairs since the new Buckinghamshire Highways contract began on 1 April. This is on top of the annual re-surfacing programme.

Since 1st April, there have been 12,700 pothole repairs carried out by 15 teams and over 30 plane and patch programmes. In addition, there have been over 21,000 drains and gullies cleaned since 1st April and over 1,200 street lights repaired.

The Council fix the most urgent repairs first and with the warmer weather will be able to fix more potholes permanently first time, instead of needing to make temporary repairs and return later. Added to this, a new time-saving three-in-one Pothole Pro machine is enabling crews to make more efficient reactive repairs across the county.

The extended plane and patch programme has begun in earnest, along with planning for the surface dressing, microsurfacing and major re-surfacing programmes that began in June.

The annual planned wider maintenance and improvements programme is well under way too – and in fact the Council are accelerating this work to address the condition of our roads sooner. Please continue to report any issues through www.buckinghamshire.gov.uk/ FixMyStreet

Annual Canvas

This month, the Council's Electoral Services team will be sending either a letter or an email to all households in Buckinghamshire as part of the annual canvass, asking residents to check their electoral

The team will also be using this opportunity to raise awareness of the new requirement for voters to provide a form of acceptable photo ID at polling stations. More information on this can be found on the council website.

It would appear from the driving through the village at school drop off and collect times that the parents of children attending school do not think that these double yellow lines or the zig zag lines directly outside the school refer to the THEM.

Comments on the village FaceBook page, and communications from the village speedwatch group show that this disregard is widespread. They block driveways and entrances to farmers fields, making it impossible for emergency services to attend, should the need arise.

You probably do not know just how much work went into this project, by the Parish Councillors, Buckinghamshire Councillors and Buckinghamshire Council, and the total disregard by some drivers is very disappointing.

Buckinghamshire Councillors and Buckinghamshire Council both monitor for effectiveness, the works that they have carried out. It would not surprise us, if one day, an enforcement officer was despatched to our village to ticket all the incorrectly parked vehicles.

We are arranging with the help of the landowner, to install one in Loosley Row, more details of this unit will be in the next Hallmark. Details will also be put on the Parish Council website, if you wish to check on its progress every now and then.

The Parish Council is a group of elected residents that work on your behalf, if there is anyone with a local problem, we would be happy to see if we can help.



Heavenly Bodies

This is a beautiful time of the year for looking upwards after the Sun sets. The majesty of the Milky Way emerges in our night skies this month, along with Saturn, two supermoons and one of the best shooting star displays of the year.

The first supermoon is on August 1st followed by the brightest supermoon of 2023 on August 31st. A supermoon is when the Moon is closer than usual to Earth and so appears a bit bigger and brighter. Having two full Moons in the same calendar month doesn't happen very often and the second one is nicknamed a 'Blue Moon'. It won't be blue. But the term blue moon apparently goes back to the 1500s in the phrase "the Moon is blue" - something that was impossible. Then for about two years after the 1883 eruption of Krakatoa as its dust lingered in the atmosphere, people across the globe could see weirdly coloured sunsets and the Moon looked blue. The phrase morphed into "once in a blue moon" - to mean rare rather than impossible.




When the Moon isn't that bright on other evenings in the month, the glorious glow of the Milky Way sweeps overhead. The skies over Lacey Green and Loosely Row are darker than many areas, giving some of the best views. This ribbon of densely-packed stars is the Orion-Cygnus arm of our own Galaxy seen by us edge-on. The image I took of it shown here reveals dust clouds, nebulae and star clusters within it. No telescope used just a budget DSLR. Look anywhere along the 'ribbon' with binoculars and it will just jump out at you!

One of the times when the Moon is out of the way is on the night of August 12th/13th, which is great news if you like shooting stars. That's the peak of the Perseid Meteor shower when the Earth's atmosphere slams into the dust left by Comet Swift-Tuttle, igniting the particles as flashes of light. The peak displays most meteors per hour but do keep a lookout for them a week before it and for the rest of the month.

Floating into view this month is wonderful Saturn and its icy rings. The planet is at its closest position to Earth on August 27th when it will appear at its biggest and brightest to us (but still more than 1 billion km away). Spot it in the south-eastern sky from 9pm after it rises and reaches its highest point at midnight. It will be above the Moon on August 30th - see graphic. Around the same date from 11pm, the mighty Jupiter will shine brightly low in the eastern sky as it starts its climb higher in the sky over next month. Enjoy!
