Greetings from Guyana!

If you remember back to the Spring 2010 issue I was appealing for support to get to Guyana. Well now I'm just finishing my fourth month here, and what a four months it's been! It certainly hasn't been easy, but I'm now starting to really enjoy it and I can't wait to get back in January and build on the relationships I've made and get involved more in the community.

My village Orealla, is a very quiet and remote place, it takes 5 hours to reach the local town, and this can't be done without missing school due to village boat times, so I have found the remoteness in terms of limited contact with friends very hard. My lack of reports has been down to the fact that I have only had Internet for a total of 3 hours in the past 4 months!

I'm spending Christmas in Tobago, with the other volunteers for some fun in the sun, as it's currently rainy season here so you can't go a day without at least one torrential downpour. It is still hot, however, and a 'cold' day is around 25-30 degrees. I laugh when kids in class complain of cold, my

response is - try living in England!

Teaching has been a massive challenge, and I would love to say that I enjoy it and have mastered it but that's far from the truth.

Naughty classes and my inexperience have been the main problem areas, as well as pure exhaustion after a solid 15 week term. There's a lot of paperwork too, but now I know the system I hope next term will be a lot easier.

It is very quiet here so usual daily routines involve a lot of 'liming' (chilling) in a hammock, and doing chores such as hand washing, which I strangely enjoy, but it helps that I get to do it in a river with an amazing view of Suriname across the water.

I also love cooking here, something I didn't do much of back home. Guyanese food tastes great, but is very unhealthy so I run a lot here, but running with a backdrop of jungle or a view of the river is a lot more enjoyable than down a road at home!

Some highlights of the past term include driving a tractor through the jungle, driving speedboats, swimming daily in the river, seeing wild monkeys and taking a boat trip


up river to do some fishing. I even caught the first catch of the day!

I can't believe I've been away for four months, in some aspects it seems forever, but in others it really has flown past.

Homesickness has been the biggest struggle, but now that I am developing better friendships here and adjusting to Amerindian life, homesickness is easing and I really am growing very fond of Orealla.

Thank you to all who supported me in getting here and hopefully I shall be in touch again soon, even though accessing email isn't exactly easy!

Chiltern Society at work in Lacey Green



During Summer 2010, a team of volunteers from the Chiltern Society spent a day working on the footpaths in Lacey Green.

We repaired the damaged steps and added new ones on the path between Grubbins Lane and Highwood Bottom and repaired the stile off Highwood Bottom.

The Chiltern Society is a local charity which aims to conserve and protect the natural beauty, environment and heritage of the Chilterns. The Society's area includes 650 square miles across parts of four counties: Bucks, Beds, Herts and South Oxfordshire.

The Chiltern Society Rights of Way Group actively protects and restores open access land and public rights of way in the Chilterns — some 5,000 paths. It surveys every individual path and takes up irregularities with parish, district or county councils to preserve and enhance public rights.

The charity has over 6,500 members and organises weekly walks and cycle rides, as well as volunteer work parties to carry out footpath maintenance and other conservation projects.

On The Farm

In October I stated that until Christmas the farm would be on routine work and maintenance. I did not mention a freeze up. I cannot remember such a prolonged cold spell before Christmas in the last fifty years. Winter of 1962/3 was heavy drifting snow that lasted, but not before Christmas.

So much has changed since then. Then there were thirty milking cows, now there are over three hundred. Cows drink vast amounts of water so it has to be kept running. No winter shelter then and they lived in an open yard behind the farmhouse. All day kettles were boiled to keep water flowing. Now the winter quarters are an open-plan complex where every animal has an individual cubicle to sleep, helps herself to food and water and passageways are scraped clean daily. The walls are vented and the big doors for tractors are half-doors; this is because it is imperative to keep air flowing to prevent pneumonia. Therefore although the heat generated by the animals must help, it is still possible for water, particularly at taps and ball-valves to freeze. This cannot be allowed when there are 300 thirsty mouths to quench. Similar buildings house the bull, young stock, dry cows and calves. This time we did not get substantial drifting - when snow can keep blocking a door faster than it can be shovelled away, but it did become very icy and men and vehicles still had to get about. At the end of the day the men are exhausted, and know that by morning that extra work will need doing over again.

Keeping the road open

Fifty years ago those thirty cows were milked in a cowshed. The milk went through a cooler in the adjoining shed then into churns which were put on a stand outside be collected on a

small lorry. Our tractor, though small, could keep a way open to the farm. Gerald Bedford, who then lived at Naphill, would go home on the tractor. The council only cleared the road into the RAF camp, throwing up the snow across the Lacey Green road. Gerald needed to clear a way through it thus rescuing people stuck on the Lacey Green side. The bus route finished there anyway.

Things are very different now. The milk is collected in an articulated tanker. These are not good on hills anyway, and as it currently comes to us towards midnight, the roads were not only steep but often icy as fresh snow fell and froze. Richard, just as exhausted as everyone else, had the added pressure of waiting for a call from the tanker saying it was stuck. At that point he would have to take a tractor and tow it up the hill. The driver also has to take it back down the hills, which is treacherous.

Massive milking tank

In 1963 our first milking parlour was installed- and churns became a thing of the past. The milk was piped to a refrigerated tank. Both parlour and tank have been updated a number of times as the herd grew. That first tank was four feet square

and three feet high, and the herd was increased to 60 cows.

Last year Richard and John were mulling over a huge decision. The current tank held 10,000 litres. Every other day collection was mooted. We needed more capacity. How big should we go to? Eventually a new tank holding 25,000 litres was installed at a cost of £65,000, including milk cooling equipment incorporating a heat recovery system. At 9,000 litres a day production we were holding 18,000 litres when one snowy Saturday the tanker couldn't get to us. Next morning the milking took us to 22,500 litres held. After the snow plough went through we blocked Woodway and held traffic so the tanker had a clear run to pull up the hill on the wrong side of the road. The big tank and that driver saved the day. The alternative would have been to tip the milk away. Many farms are isolated, countryside. Milk could quickly become very scarce!

As Christmas Eve came it was hoped there would be nothing else extra to contend with, and at least that Dick, who looks after the calves, could go home early. What happened? Four cows had their calves. Well, Christmas is a time for new birth!

Lacey Green Windmill

During 2010 we obtained our own electricity supply and the windmill was rewired with new lighting throughout. With the legislation of recent years, such work, especially for a timber building which is open to the public, has to be done by a professional electrician able to issue the necessary certificates for the work done.

The work was completed at the beginning of August, and has been done as unobtrusively as possible, but using armoured cable and using watertight fittings wherever possible. All lights are energy saving bulbs in enclosed fittings, with a total of 36 lamps only using 450 watts. The lighting is deliberately not too bright but it now extends to parts of the mill that were very dark before, particularly the interior of the cap (see photo).

The project was by far the most expensive work we have carried out to the mill, but I am pleased to say that the Chiltern Society were able

to obtain a substantial grant towards the cost of the work. The grant also included the cost of certain other items, such as new notice boards for inside the windmill. They will be used for a new enlarged display showing the restoration work which was started 40 years ago this year.

During 2010 we had a total of 739 visitors inside the windmill, an average of 25 on each open afternoon. This is rather less than usual, but the weather was not in our favour again, with an early hot and dry spell and a late cold and wet spell. These are the two types of weather which stop people going out for a day.

Our committee is grateful to our volunteers who enable us to open the windmill, and if anybody would like further details on joining our team of wardens, I would be delighted to hear from them.

For 2011 we are changing our opening hours, by bringing them forward by half an hour. We will be open from 2 pm until 5 pm on Sundays and Bank Holiday

Mondays from the 1st May until 25th September. Admission will be £2 per adult, and £1 per child aged 5-15.



The long awaited cuts to Government Council Grants are now becoming a reality. The process of deciding how these will affect council spending is now under way.

There is a mixture of good and bad news. As you may know the Council's Revenue is made up basically of two parts: Revenue Support Grant (RSG) from Government and Council Tax from residents. For the **County Council** the bad news is that 14.3% is cut from the RSG and other grant support. The good news is that, providing council tax is set at 0% or below, then an additional 'one-off' payment of 2.5% against council tax will be made. This does mean that there is still an overall reduction in spending capacity as many grants have been withdrawn or rolled into the revenue settlement. The overall effect for this year for all grants looks to be a circa £14m reduction and with further cuts totaling £58m over the next three years, the Council will have to look hard for savings if it is to live within its means. A freeze on pay for both employees and members is already in force and a programme of

transformation based on efficiency savings, is in place.

Consultations on savings

Most service areas are facing reductions. For those major areas at risk: youth services; transport; and some adult social care services; proposals for fundamental change are being developed for their delivery. In order to take into account the public's views on their redesign, separate consultations are being carried out in addition to the consultations on libraries, day care services and transportation which are already underway.

Consultations are now published, focusing on four areas:

- Capital and revenue budget
- Transport - road safety, street lighting, buses
- Adult Social Care
- Youth Services

These consultations will take into account feedback already received through the 2010 Bucks Debate and give a further chance for residents to have their say on the proposals being made. The consultation documents are available on line at www.buckscc.gov.uk/budget. For those without access to the Internet please call 01296 395000 to get help.

Capital Funding increase

There is some good news for capital funding. Changes to the way the government calculate the sums due to each council mean, that for the first time in some years, the County Council will actually receive capital grant. For Bucks £31m will be paid for 2011/2012 allowing a substantial capital programme to be developed.

Wycombe District

For Wycombe District the overall considerations will be similar but because the split between Revenue Grant and Council Tax is different, the Minister for Local Government Eric Pickles, is still looking at ways to minimise the impact on the Districts. I believe the final figures will be made known at the end of January so until then District budget details are not available. It is however known that the provisional settlement sees a reduction in RSG of 15.8% in 2011/12 and a further 12% in 2012/13.

Fire Authority cuts

For the **Fire Authority** cuts in support grants have been made and plans are in place to reorganise the service to accommodate a reduced budget. These mostly concentrate on reducing the overheads by restructuring the administration so preserving the frontline delivery of emergency cover.

Winter road conditions

The recent severe **winter conditions** have again brought the County Council's ability to react into sharp focus not only with the way gritting and snow clearance is carried but also to deal with the aftermath over pot holes and drainage problems on country roads.

With regard to snow clearance I would like to thank the farmers who, due to a change in council policy, made plant available to help those areas not on ploughing routes. Their actions made conditions much easier for those normally left out.

Working with the Parish Council we have been able to install some more grit bins on those areas where

people have indicated problems exist. More are promised for next year as funding permits. With temperatures falling to record lows the aftermath has been, and continues to leave Council resources stretched to make timely repairs. I have been making officers aware of the dangerous situations that have occurred and asked that repairs are made. In particular I have locally highlighted New Road, Main Road and Woodway in Lacey Green and Kop Hill as high risk areas where vehicles swerve to avoid damage to their cars.

District Council projects

On-going **District Council** projects such as the new Community Stadium for Wycombe Wanderers and Wasps linked to a Sports Village and the Council Housing Transfer to Red Kite, are high on the agenda.

Community Stadium

Consultation on where the new **Community Stadium** should be sited suggested that the only viable

site was on part of the Wycombe Air Park. This has rightly raised concerns about the impact on Green Belt/AONB land and whether or not there are 'very special circumstances' that would permit such a development to proceed. So far the Council and the Clubs have each committed £180,000 capital to the project and a recent meeting of the Council Scrutiny Commission has suggested that no firm decision should be made until compelling evidence that the Sporting, Business and Environmental cases clearly shows that the 'very special circumstances' exist.

Community Housing

The proposal to **transfer council housing** to Red Kite Community Housing, a new tenant-led local housing organisation, has progressed to the consultation phase with tenants and leaseholders. Following the completion of the consultation the District Council will decide whether to progress further with a ballot of tenants and leaseholders on the proposals.

HS2

High Speed 2 remains a major concern. With the announcement of the preferred route through Wendover and Ellesborough Parishes the threat to our protected countryside remains high.

Wycombe District Council debated the issue recently and a letter has been sent asking the minister to explain the reasons why he feels it is in the national interest to proceed and when he will release the supporting business case. It is the view of the Council that without such evidence consultation on any part of the route carries very little credibility.

It should also be noted that the choice of route 3 does not mean that route 2.5 is removed from the table. It could be possible that failure on the first preferred route means that the original second choice, route 2.5 comes back into the frame.

2011 Census is coming

Sunday 27 March is census day. It's very important that everyone in the country completes a census questionnaire. Decisions about the allocation of millions of pounds of grants from central government to local authorities and health authorities depend directly on population estimates made by the Office for National Statistics (ONS) based on census data.

All census information can be found at www.census.gov.uk

Questionnaires will be delivered to every household by post, and to certain communal establishments by hand-delivery to, for example, the establishment manager for internal distribution with arrangements made by us for collection.

The questionnaire may be completed and returned by post, or else completed securely on-line

The census telephone help line will be active from 4 March to respond to any request for help - which may include pointers to multilingual guidance booklets or accessibility aids such as large-print or braille questionnaires, easy-read versions, text relay and British Sign Language resources, or a request for a member of census field staff to visit personally to give assistance with completion

Grit bins

Recently, we were able to get three new grit bins provided in the Parish; one in Lower Road, one in Greenlands and one above the Old Plow in Speen. They have certainly proved useful – the one in Loosley Row has already been emptied and refilled three times! Bucks County Council will refill when it can.

For those that may not be aware, it is essential that grit bins be in a location approved by BCC, otherwise they probably won't get refilled.

Planning issues.

The Parish Council is one of the statutory consultees with regard to planning applications within the Parish. Others are the neighbours of the site for which the planning application has been submitted, but the planning authority tends to take a rather limited view of what constitutes a neighbour. If you are either side, you will probably be consulted, but someone across the road is unlikely to be asked.

The Parish Council has but limited say. There is the Village Design Statement and we will try to use this more extensively in future.

However, there was a rather disturbing comment recently by the Planning Inspectorate in Bristol to the effect that the VDS didn't have much credibility because of the limited consultation process during its compilation. We intend to find out more.

The timing of planning applications is random. For the benefit of interested parishioners, we usually identify new applications on the agenda for Council meetings. Applications that arrive too late for inclusion on the agenda will be discussed, but the public won't be informed in advance.

You are advised to look at the WDC website for up to date information about all applications

Affordable Housing

There has been no progress at all. It is now several years since the Rural Housing Trust carried out its survey and concluded that there was a need for six 'affordable' houses in each of Lacey Green/Loosley Row and Speen.

We identified several potential exception sites where such houses might be located, but most of them have been found unsuitable. The ones that were suitable were those where the landowners simply weren't prepared to sell.

One solution would be to require developments on substantial areas of land to include some affordable housing, or indeed any other facility of benefit to the community.

It would also help if planning were less focussed on piecemeal individual applications, but looked at a selected area, and endeavoured to formulate constructive development for that area including facilities other than housing, so that the whole community gained something.

Perhaps the latest government proposals for giving parishes a greater say in planning matters will help.

Providing 'affordable' houses, or smaller houses in general, is fraught with difficulties. These include the shortage of building land, the existence of the 'green belt' or other similar constraints, and the greater profit that can be made from building larger houses.

There is also the potential unpopularity of such developments with some residents, which can result in political mayhem such as that seen in one of our neighbouring parishes.

The problem of litter

On walking round the area recently, I have noticed just how much litter is scattered around the place. It looks awful but we can all do something about it.

When you do go for a walk locally, carry a suitable bag and pick up any litter. It would make a tremendous difference to the appearance of the Parish.

There is a theory, that if a place is visibly neat and tidy, then people tend not to scatter their rubbish in quite so casual a way. At least, one would like to think so.

Roman snails are now rare and the Chiltern Hills is one of few areas of

the country where they are to be found.

As we returned across the grassy slopes we passed some fine examples of cattle but no one could recognise the breed.

We are so fortunate to live in the beautiful Chiltern countryside.



Bowling

A top-class batsmen and a superb slip-fielder - some of his catches would have graced any class of cricket.

What Frank didn't know at the time was that not only had he gained a cricketer but a future son-in-law, for Ivor eventually married his daughter, Joan. Together they had three sons, Terry, Ian and Nigel (all talented cricketers) and a daughter, Anne. To them we offer our condolences at this sad time. Ivor died just before Xmas after a long illness.

But Ivor didn't just play cricket. He was very active in the community. When the bar was set up in the pavilion he organised and ran it for several years. He also acted as clerk to Stokenchurch Parish Council.

Heavenly Bodies

Have you seen a star in recent weeks? Even the hint of a glimpse of a tantalising dot in the sky, apart from a snow flake, would have been an achievement in itself among those claustrophobic clouds. But that just means we'll more fully appreciate those clandestine celestial jewels when crystal clear nights return! And when they do, we'll be able to see two gas giants, an ice giant, Earth's 'twin', the continued splendour of Orion (see last issue), and the reassuring presence of the spring constellations.

Earth is now leaving the giant gas ball Jupiter in its wake, after we overtook the big fella on our smaller 'inside lap' of the Solar System on September 21st last year. So February is your last, best chance to see the King of the Planets which appears after sunset, low in the south-west. It's the brightest blob out there, and very easy to spot. For a wondrous sight, look for the white sliver of the crescent Moon on the evening of February 6 from 6pm in the same direction, and you'll see Jupiter to its left. Below and to the right of

Jupiter will be the icy giant Uranus, visible in binoculars. Fear not, Jupiter will return later this year.

Also in February, early-risers will be dazzled by an intense light, low in the south-east. This is Venus, about the same size as Earth, which is visible between 6.30-7am just before the Sun pops up over the horizon.

So that leaves the remaining gas giant, and many people's favourite – Saturn – which is double the distance of Jupiter from us. Earth is now catching up with the 'ringed wonder' which begins to be visible during the more civilised hours of the evening. Saturn now has the backdrop of the constellation of Virgo. A good way to locate it is to find the distinctive outline of the stars in the Leo constellation, especially the back-to-front "?" question-mark, or sickle on its right. At the bottom of the question-mark is the brighter star Regulus. Spot this and find the bright star way over to the left and lower, Spica in Virgo. Using the diagram shown here, you'll be able to track down Saturn which is easily visible with


the naked eye. The Moon sits close to the planet and Spica on February 20th to form a triangle. Saturn gets its closest to Earth for the year on April 4, when it will be 800 million miles away.

Our view of Saturn for the past few years has been looking up to its south pole. As the geometry of the Solar System unwound, Saturn became level and so the rings were edge-on to us for a while. Last year, the rings "flipped" downwards as Saturn began to point its north pole towards us. The north pole will continue to lean more and more towards us, thus opening up the rings even further to put on their magnificent display. In 15 years' time, the rings will return to be edge-on to us again, and the process will continue.

So here's to clear skies! Watch out for a lunar eclipse in June – details in next issue.

This year's Astro Talk by Chris Dignan, postponed from December, will take place on Sunday March 20th from 6.45pm at Lacey Green Village Hall
