
Sadly this will be our last concert with our present conductor, Mrs. Fiona Insley. If anyone knows of someone who might like to take

Wildlife Notes

This is the time of year when it pays to be on your guard against unwelcome guests who drop by uninvited and stay for weeks on end.

No, not the in-laws this time, but the equally-dreaded harlequin ladybirds. Their natural home is thousands of miles away in eastern Asia, but over the past thirty years they have deliberately been spread around the world in the hope that they might help to control 'pests' such as greenfly.

They first appeared in this country just seven years ago (perhaps by making their own way across the Channel or by hitchhiking on imported items from Europe or North America), but already they have made themselves comfortable right across England and are now a common sight in our area.

Harlequins can breed at an astounding rate (a single female can produce over a thousand offspring, each of which will be ready to start a family of its own within about three weeks) and eat as if there is no tomorrow, demolishing aphids by the thousand.

The trouble is that once all the local greenfly have been polished off the harlequins are happy to prey on the eggs and caterpillars of our native butterflies and moths, and even on other ladybirds.

Like so many introduced species, such as the grey squirrel, the muntjac deer and the edible dormouse (Glis glis), harlequin ladybirds are already far too well established to ever be completely eradicated from Britain.

As yet it is too soon to know what effect they may have on our local wildlife. But the problem doesn't end there, because after a busy year's feeding the harlequins like to come indoors for the winter, often in their hundreds or even thousands.

A lady in Downley told me that she sometimes gets so many of them in her house that she has to vacuum them off her window to stop them from darkening the room! Their droppings can stain curtains and furniture. If they wake up peckish during the winter they have been known to give unwary householders a gentle nip to test whether they are edible (suddenly the thought of a visit from the in-laws doesn't seem quite so bad does it?).

Harlequins do seem to be quite selective about where they hibernate and, with a bit of luck and some good draught-excluder, your house won't get the harlequin 5-star rating, but if you do find yourself invaded please let me know before you get out the vacuum so that I can come and take some photographs (01844 344606; johnclarketyler@gmail.com).

Footpath Success

Due to an 'oversight' on the part of the County Council well over sixty years ago, part of public footpath L20, Kiln Lane to Main Road, via Goodacres Lane, has never appeared on the County's Definitive Footpath Map.

Despite 'Public Footpath' signs having always been in place throughout those many years, directing the walker along Goodacres Lane, the County Council claimed this section of the path was not a public footpath!

The Parish Council is pleased to announce that after a prolonged campaign by our longest serving Councillor, Cllr. Dennis Claydon, together with letters from members of the public, the Goodacres Lane section of L20 is now officially recognised.

Not many people were aware that this footpath, which runs from Kiln Lane in a north-westerly direction towards the Windmill, according to the map, ended at a field boundary in the middle of nowhere! Local people have walked this path and turned left to reach Goodacres Lane and Main Road as long as Dennis can remember.

Now, after an investigation and public consultation the County Council have confirmed the 'missing link' as a public footpath.

National Planning Policy Framework

The Government is conducting a consultation on the proposed planning reforms in the draft National Planning Policy Framework.

It has said that its priorities are to rebuild Britain's economy and to increase levels of house building. It thinks that the planning system has a key role to play by ensuring that sustainable development to support this growth is able to proceed as easily as possible.

It has, therefore, drafted a new set of planning rules which mean that there will be a presumption that the answer to all planning applications is "yes" unless there are strong reasons to say "no".

Green Belt, Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty and Conservation Areas will still be protected under the new rules but undeveloped land outside the Green Belt will not be protected.

Where there is not an adopted local development plan in place which identifies the specific areas and types of development required for that neighbourhood, then a developer can present his own proposal and there will be a presumption in favour of sustainable development.

There is opposition to these proposals including that from the Campaign for Rural England and the National Trust. There are likely to be changes to this bill before it becomes law.

Neighbourhood Development Plans

The Government has also put in place new powers for small neighbourhoods – such as parish/town councils in rural areas or local neighbourhood groups in urban areas - to create their own plans.

These 'neighbourhood plans' offer local groups the chance to get directly involved in the planning process and to shape the future of their own areas.

The plan, developed through public engagement and consultation, would be subject to independent examination and a local referendum. This process would involve a lot of work, time and resources.

Government guidance says that plans should only be used to plan for more development than already planned for and they are not a means of just saying "no" to development.

The Parish of Lacey Green lies entirely within the Green Belt and therefore the opportunities for development may be rather limited.

The Parish Council is considering whether a Neighbourhood Development Plan would be appropriate for Lacey Green, Loosley Row and Speen.

County Council News



Health Issues

Responsibility for Public Health is returning to the County Council. Together with the District Councils they will be expected to deliver on preventative measures designed to improve the County's physical and mental health and tackle issues such as those related to drugs and drink. All of this will present some very challenging times for the Councils charged with delivering better health for everybody.

Health changes are beginning to take shape in Bucks with the new arrangements for considering strategy being undertaken by the Shadow Health and Wellbeing Board. This board first met in May and includes representatives from the County and District Councils, the PCT, user groups and the GPs Consortium. Together they will map out the priorities for health delivery in Bucks.

The major change will come in 2013 when the PCT will cease to exist and the new arrangements will be in place for health delivery.

Hospital Trusts are again looking to find new ways to deliver their services more effectively. In

September the NHS started

on a process of consultation that will affect us all. The initial work was to identify those specific services which will be formally consulted upon early next year. This includes areas such as A&E delivery which could lead to radical change in the way we access these services.

Transportation

Improvement of the local roads has remained a priority, so it is good to see improvements coming through. New Road and Rignal Road have seen work done to improve the surfacing and the long awaited works to Bryants Bottom Road and Flowers Bottom Lane have been completed.

New Road was to receive additional surface dressing to seal and improve the running surface; however the weather conditions in early September meant that this treatment could not be laid effectively and works were rescheduled for spring 2012.

This work followed the release of circa £3M, for road repairs to boost a 2 year programme. problems and track the work.

High Speed 2

HS2 has been given a renewed focus with Martin Tett leading on the issue. 17 Local Authorities have now joined forces to fight the proposals with your County Council taking the lead. The group is named the 51M Group which represents the cost in millions to each and every parliamentary constituency.

It certainly has made an impact and had its voice heard at the HS2 Parliamentary Select Committee where Martin was invited to give evidence.

Parish Community Planning Group

The Community Planning Group has not been in the news recently, but does have two major present activities.

We deliver a Welcome Pack to new residents in the Parish, hopefully within a few days of their arrival. However, I suspect that we may miss someone from time to time, so we would be very pleased to receive appropriate news from residents. If you find that you have a new neighbour, please tell Angela Agate (273916) or me, so that we can do the necessary.

Our other main job at present is to run the Lacey Green Stores, with our very excellent team of volunteers. The Stores has now been going for over two years, and is able to supply basic foods and household requirements. The Stores can also provide newspapers to order between Monday and Friday.

It would be good if we could also stock fresh vegetables, and we would like to know whether any horticulturalists have surplus vegetables for which they would like an outlet. If you have, please let us know so that we can come to a suitable arrangement.

We do need more volunteers for the Lacey Green Stores. Although it is helpful to have a reasonably regular commitment, it isn't absolutely essential. So if you can only provide a couple of hours or so occasionally, then you would still be welcome to join the team. If we can increase our number we may be able to open the store for longer, and provide better service to the village.

Elsewhere in this copy of Hallmark there is a note from the Parish Council concerning neighbourhood plans. You will all have seen media comment about the potential ruination of the countryside by unscrupulous developers. How true some of the comments may be is still unclear, and I do not know how vulnerable some parts of our Parish might be to commercial developers. The existence of a neighbourhood plan should at least help provide a better degree of protection. So far there does not appear to have been much action by Parishes, possibly because it is likely to involve considerable effort and may be expensive. So feedback from residents would be welcomed.

The Community Planning Group has produced a Parish Plan, although this covers all aspects of Parish life and is not concerned specifically with planning and the use of land. The Village Design Statement does do so, and identifies areas of Lacey Green and Loosley Row where no development is wanted. However, there is no mention of potential development elsewhere within the parish, and it would appear that some proposals for such development may be required in a neighbourhood plan.

Sports Club: Tennis section

The tournaments on 4 September were disrupted by heavy rain, which curtailed the junior boys tournament after only 3 matches. Although the tournament was meant to be completed on the following Sunday – when the weather was fine and sunny - not everyone turned up!

Having said that, the junior competitions throughout the year have been a great success and has put the club into third place for Regularly Competing Juniors in the Bucks LTA county league table of Restricted Places to Play for clubs without flood lights. This is one of the key indicators that the LTA use to judge whether or not to provide grants or loans to tennis clubs. The other key indicator is the number of British Tennis Members of which the club has more than 100.

We have plenty of scope for new members and to open the club for the wider community including for example Royal Air Force High Wycombe tennis players and the Speen tennis court users. Clearly, we need people using the courts regularly to maintain active membership and to keep the club going.

The tennis club wrapped up the last of its competitive fixtures in the Aylesbury league with the ladies final match at Great Missenden on 6 September.

Overall, the results this year were a bit disappointing with men's and mixed teams both being relegated to lower divisions basically for winning too few matches and losing too many. At the level we play, the matches are meant to be played in a friendly and good spirited manner at different clubs mostly to enjoy the social aspects of tennis with likeminded people.

Unfortunately, we have had too few men playing regularly at the club during the season to put together regular pairings and have really struggled to put out a team. We even conceded a home fixture due to lack of players. We will need more players coming forward for us to have any chance of entering a Men's team next year.

The Ladies team has had more players to call upon and played all their matches, with mixed results so will remain in Division 7. The good news is that they do hold regular practice sessions twice a week and have entertained a couple of friendly tournaments against the ladies from Speen. As Speen has just one court they really appreciate the opportunity for friendly match-play, tea and cakes at Lacey Green.

The tennis club needs more help from volunteers to raise money and for people to give whatever practical assistance they can to maintain the tennis facilities. The Sports Club has many volunteers who take care of the cricketfootball ground and pavilion whereas we see only the same few people maintaining the tennis club, which is neither fair nor sustainable.

While Sports Club finances are in good shape thanks to income from the tennis, football and cricket sections, the bar and preschool, the tennis club is reliant only on subscriptions from its members. I am sure no one would want to see the village lose the tennis facilities but it's going to need considerably more effort and investment to maintain the facility, cover the cost of resurfacing, and make the annual fee required by the Sports Club for access to the grounds.

From the imaginative poetic world of *A Midsummer Night's Dream* to the down-to-earth delights of the Food Festival, Speen Festival offered something for everyone in 17 amazing events over 11 days in September. A windy and wet start failed to dampen spirits and visitor numbers were up yet again.

Under the banner of 'celebrating local talent and creativity in the heart of the Chilterns', this Festival included a rich choice of music, from the serene voices of The Elysian Singers, to the stylish Jazz Concert featuring the Martin Hart Quintet, and a 'folk rock' night with Bucks band Dirty Mavis at the King William pub.

On the Farm

It is true that the farm work never stops, but in September a great turn round takes place. The harvest hopefully is in, which I'm glad to say ours was, and the quality was good, despite having to dry most of it. The oil seed rape did particularly well with a very high oil content.

We have fixed the price for much of the grain for different months of sale. Will we end up with above average price? There is no way of knowing. Like all commodities it is traded on the futures markets and can be hedged many times over.

But time is of the essence and close behind the combine, balers and carters, in went the cultivators and seed drills in preparation for next years crops. What to grow had already been decided, the seed purchased and was straightway planted.

As I write this in mid-October there is only one crop still to harvest. This is the maize. We grow several fields of it but it is not native to the U.K. It is not frost hardy, cannot be planted until late April and has to be completely mature before it is chopped up and clamped for cattle food. Hence October. Our main crop of all is grass, which we harvest on off lying land all summer, starting in May until it stops growing. It is made into silage for the animals in the winter.

Soon the dairy herd will be in their winter quarters. Going in for milking twice a day the ground soon ends up a quagmire as I very well remember. On every dairy farm could be seen cows struggling over their knees in mud, even people leaving their boots behind in it. Who says it was the 'good old days'? It's not what we want and the cows hated it.

Even in the spring when there is enough grass for them and they first go out it only takes a bit of cold and they are right back in again, they have that option. Some beef cattle stay out but get fed in the field if the grass cannot support them. The dry cows, calves and yearlings are under cover of their own and have to be fed appropriately.

Feeding three hundred+ milking cows is quite a commitment. Hungry cows are not happy cows! Our aim is to keep them contented, healthy, able to milk well, get in calf quite quickly so that they calve annually, and maintain their body condition.

With all this in mind it is critical that their rations are as absolutely perfect as possible. In winter the grass in the fields is replaced by grass, maize and wholecrop silage produced on the farm during the year. To it is added wheat that we grow and other feeds which we buy, mainly by-products from human foods such as rape meal, soya bean meal, confectionary waste, sugar beet pulp, orange peel pulp, and brewers' grains. To this mix is added minerals, yeast, limestone flour, ground linseed, and salt. A nutritionist visits regularly to help formulate the ration. If we get all this right our cows will be productive and give us a return on our efforts to look after them.

It is not only cows that need a healthy diet. It is now repeatedly stressed that we humans do too. But there is one very significant difference. The animals need theirs to stay the same. Changes need to be very gradual and if some commodity becomes unavailable we have to be very careful with what we replace it.

Their routine at Christmas will be just the same as every other day. They will not be given a special Christmas dinner, no rich extra treats, so they won't get upset stomachs, or indigestion. Spare a thought for happy, healthy cows at Christmas, as you celebrate whichever way you choose. Happy Christmas.

Heavenly Bodies

Now is the glorious season of skygazing! Those tantalising twinkles in the night sky are even more enticing as they glow more intensely against winter's inky black backdrop. On a clear night, you can see a blizzard of more stars in the early evening than at any other time of the year.


As the chill increases, we see some very classy constellations showing off their frosted jewellery. Look at the stars, and then look again and notice that they are not all white. Oranges, blues and reds speckle the heavens as we witness the stars at different stages of their life.

Among those distant droplets, our Solar System assembles an aerial winter wonderland. You've probably noticed a very bright looking 'star' recently in the southern skies, sometimes flirting with the Moon. This white blaze is Jupiter, big enough to swallow 1,500 Earths. The gas giant was closest to us at the end of October – a mere 369 million miles away. You can't miss it if you gaze southwards. Using a pair of binoculars, focus on a star so that it becomes the smallest dot of light possible and then find Jupiter and see how many of its four largest moons you can see. Look out too on December 6 when the Moon flies above the planet - see sky map.

Jupiter stays with us well into the New Year, and is joined by two more of its planetary siblings – a goddess of love, and a god of war. Venus, about the same size as Earth, remains shy until mid-November when she starts to dazzle above the horizon where the Sun has just set (southwest). Venus too flirts with the Moon, and one rendezvous can be glimpsed during a very thin crescent Moon just above the planet on December 27 (4.45pm to 6.30pm). Over the weeks, Venus climbs higher and shines brighter, always just after sunset. By late December and into January, you'll see Venus and Jupiter in the same half of the sky

The bellicose planet is, of course, the Red one - Mars. About half the width of Earth, it starts to take its place in the sky about now but late at night. It becomes larger, brighter and earlier during spring as Earth closes in on its rocky neighbour. More on spotting Mars in the next issue, but for now keep your eyes on the news. The largest Mars rover yet is set to launch on November 25. NASA's 'Curiosity' Mars Science Laboratory is the size of a car (compared to the 'washing machine' dimensions of 'Spirit' and 'Opportunity'). Will it find evidence of life ..?
