Anyone who is studying communications or journalism might like to add to their CV by writing for Hallmark.


We also need a regular supply of front page artwork or photographs. If you have a piece of art you would like to feature, or a seasonal wildlife photo you are proud of, let me know.

This year we have been fortunate to have been given a tape recording made by John Brandon, describing the village, its houses and inhabitants in the 1930s. This covers one side of the Main Road, from the Whip to the school end of Lacey Green. Originally there was a similar record of the other side of the road, but this has been lost.

Dennis, Doug and Gordon have now produced one describing this area, from their memories of just before the Second World War. Rita, Joyce, Rene, Dudley and Mary Lawrence are working on one for Loosley Row. We would like to thank Clive at the shop for his help and encouragement. We could not have done this without him. The last area which we hope to cover is Pink Road, Parslows Hillock and Redlands End. If you can help with any information about this area, please let us know.

We shall be playing these recordings, and also showing slides of some of the houses and people referred to from our collection of archive photographs. We now have an even larger collection, thanks to the generosity of Stephen Brandon (son of John).

There will also be a static exhibition of family trees, including Dell, Floyd, Saunders and Claydon and the very extensive "Janes", family tree, which has been occupying Joan for most of this year. We are interested in hearing from anyone who has their own local family tree, and would be willing to bring it to the meeting.

These recordings have been made from personal memories, and there may be some inaccuracies. Please let us know of any you are aware of so that we can correct them. Group members will also respect the wishes of any residents who do not wish their houses to be mentioned.

## The Princes Centre



The Princes Centre is run by the people of Princes Risborough for everybody who lives in the town and surrounding areas. The Princes Centre's primary mission is to provide a local base day care centre that the community can use, enjoy and foster good community relationships.

The focus is on positive interactions across our diverse community and providing support and affordable, enjoyable experiences for all. The Princes Centre is a place to gain information and support to help people live independent and safe enjoyable lives within Risborough.



### Funding

Until last year the centre had been funded by Bucks County Council. However, in 2011 the Council announced proposals to close down the centre and sell the site.

Risborough Cares immediately launched a campaign to save the centres and organised a protest petition of over 3000 signatures.

Finally after continued pressure extended by the Town Council, Risborough Cares and our County Councillor permission was given to the local community to provide Day Care services. However, there would be no public funding. The terms were a peppercorn rent for two years with the option to purchase the building at the end of that period.

So in June 2012 a Social Enterprise Group consisting of representatives from the Town Council, Churches Together, Risborough Cares Charity and the Risborough Area Partnership was setup, the aim being to operate a combined centre, titled the "Princes Centre".

## Activities at the Centre

At the heart of the centre is the provision of a safe place for older people, people with learning and or physical disabilities, sensory impairments or mental health issues to gain support, learn or maintain life skills and socialise.

Many activities are run at the Centre and can be accessed by all. These include:

- Crafts. Art, Pottery
- Exercise Classes
- Cookery
- Advice and counselling
- Health promotion and information, complimentary therapies
- Music, films
- Quizzes

We have introduced scheduled activities within the centre, which are proving to be really popular. Armchair exercises appear to be a hit with everyone and produce a great deal of laughter and fun.

Clients have also been making Jewellery and Greeting Cards, which are available for purchase at the Centre.



#### How to join

Anybody who would like to attend the Centre should make contact with the Centre Manager. They will then be offered an appointment to either come to the Centre or be visited at their home. Because the Centre takes a very personalised approach, the first visit is to discuss with the person their own needs and what they would like to gain from attending.

### How can you help

The vital service needed by local people has continued without a break, but we are in need of successful fundraising to ensure the long term future of high quality day care in the Risborough area.

# Obituary: Doris Oliver 1913 - 2013

Doris's mother came from an old High Wycombe family of chair makers, and her uncles had founded the well known building firm of White Brothers. Her father, Frank Greenway, had come from the West Country and she was brought up in a Grocery shop in Hughenden Road. Her first school was Priory Road. She could just remember the flags being hung up to celebrate the end of the First World War.

She passed a scholarship to the High School, and enjoyed her time there. She excelled at sport, music and maths. Her first job was in the Estate Office at West Wycombe. At 17 she began work in the office of Walter Baker, where her future husband, Andrew Oliver worked.

They shared a mutual interest in motor cars. Doris obtained her first licence a few days before she was 17, and was sent on her own to collect a new car from Morris motors in Oxford. This was very unusual at the time, but she was not worried. She was always adventurous and enjoyed a challenge. Throughout her life she drove everything from a motor bike to a large lorry.

She would not agree to marry Andrew until 1937. She said she was enjoying life too much to be tied down. They set up home in a large house on the West Wycombe Road, which they intended to renovate, but the war put an end to that. She entertained a succession of evacuees. Some were delightful and became family friends, others were extremely difficult. After a year or two she was called up, but as she had become pregnant, she remained at home.

Rosemary was born in 1943. By then Doris' husband was working on the top secret development of the mosquito aeroplane, so Doris was left to manage on her own. Andrew was always very hospitable. Doris learned to entertain a succession of young servicemen passing through Wycombe and other people in need. In spite of rationing, she always managed to make a meal for them. It was another challenge.

Her son Andy was born in 1945. Andrew was exhausted by his war work, and felt that he would like a more peaceful life in the country. He had been orphaned at 6, but his parents had worked on the land, so he decided to look for a small farm. He found one in Lacev Green, a village which he already knew, as he had been required to fly out of the small airfield behind the School to inspect crashed mosquitos to determine that the crash had not been caused by failure in the special plywood which he had developed in Doris' kitchen.

Sunny Bank Farm (now White House Farm) was purchased in 1947, but they were not able to move until 1949, as it was in such a run down condition. It was an idyllic place to bring up children. Doris was happy to move as long as she could have a car!

Only a couple of years later they moved to a smallholding in Church Lane – Tor Cottage (now called Trillium). Andrew returned to work and Doris was running the enterprise more or less alone. She enjoyed this. She loved animals, and would rather run a business than do housework. With two children at school, she made friends in the village, and was enjoying life.

Eventually the smallholding became too much for her. She and Andrew chose a retirement Bungalow in Kiln Lane, where Rosemary still lives. It needed room for four garages and a workshop, so that Andrew could pursue his interest in vintage cars and do a little woodwork. Doris delighted in driving the cars, and they went to many interesting events and met like minded people who became lifelong friends.

Andrew developed cancer, and died in 1979. Doris nursed him to the end, with support from their wonderful GP. – Peter Appleton. Not long after that, an old family friend, Harry Floyd was in need of help. He had always been rather sickly, and his eyesight was now failing. He was welcomed into the home, and Doris and Rosemary took care of him until his death. It was through him that they both learned a great deal about village history.

Doris had always loved craft, and could turn her hand to almost anything. When she discovered that the village was famous for lace making, she learned to do that also. At Wycombe College, she was taught by her old maths teacher – Miss Dawson from Speen. In later years she joined the Women's Institute. Whilst she slept through many of the talks, she loved the company of the other members, and they were very kind to her.

Doris enjoyed a happy, healthy and productive life until she was 90, when she suffered the first of a number of small strokes, which eventually led to vascular dementia. She was nursed at home until 2008, when she was admitted to a home near Wendover, and she died 5 years later at the age of 99 years.

# Lacey Green Cricket Club

I was saddened to hear the news that Geoff Gomme had passed away. It is testament to his dedication to the Cricket team, that while very ill in hospital he still made sure that someone was writing the Cricket article for the Hallmark.

Geoff was ever present for the 15 or so years that I've played cricket at Lacey Green, and always had an opinion on how the team was doing, and what we could do to improve. We may not always have agreed with him, but his passion was always evident, and Geoff was always ready to step in and help out. He will be missed!

The 1st XI season was a mixed one. We lacked any stability in the batting and were too often bowled out for low scores. There were some notable batting performances, with new player Tanveer Mehmood scoring 90 in a losing run chase against The Lee, and a match-winning 78 against Widmer End, on a truly awful wicket. There were also contributions from Dervck Marshall (50) and Martin Exley (40) in a vain attempt to chase 271 at Prestwood. Batting performance of the year however

was the first wicket stand of 180 between Deryck Marshall (80)and David Highgate (79) at The Lee where we won by 9 wickets batting second.

Our bowling attack was much strengthened this year and there were several excellent performances. Special mention should be made of the performance from Martin Exley which included three wickets in three balls, his first ever hat trick in senior cricket. It was a long time coming! A five wicket haul is rare in modern limited overs cricket, where bowlers are restricted to 12 overs each. This is now being changed to 10 overs, which will make it even more difficult. ## District Council News



The new financial year sees a change within Wycombe District Council as a new Leader, Cllr Richard Scott and Deputy Leader, Cllr Hugh McCarthy, take over from Cllr Alex Collingwood and Cllr Roger Wilson. As your Ward Councillor, I will now also hold the position of Cabinet Member for Finance, having served as Cabinet Spokesperson for Finance since February of this year.

You will be aware that Wycombe District Council Tax was not increased for the 3rd successive year, however, vital services have been maintained. This has been achieved by a combination of 'backroom' business process efficiencies and improved procurement (such as the new Waste Service Contract) combining to reduce operating costs, despite inflation and continuing cuts in funding from Central Government.

The new Waste Service Contract has been successfully introduced – in fact, apart from different vehicles, many people have noticed no difference in service, although the cost savings took effect from late March of this year. The introduction of new recyclable collections, for example for glass, will take place later this year.

### HS2 Update

As mentioned in the last edition of Hallmark, the 5 Judicial Reviews concerning High Speed 2 have now been heard.

Unfortunately, and as feared, the outcome was not favourable, with only the challenge on Property Blight and Compensation being accepted. The ludge decided that the 2012 consultation on compensation was flawed - he said it was so unfair as to be unlawful and the process should no longer stand. As a result, the Government will have to re-consult and reconsider its position. Although the route of HS2 does not directly affect our area, the delay and exposure of the Government's flawed and biased approach to the overall project should help stimulate wider public opposition to HS2.

Of key significance is the decision by the High Speed Two Action Alliance (HS2AA) – with whom our local area action group is closely affiliated - and the 51M group of 14 local councils to appeal against the Judge's decision in the case of the second JR. This relates to whether HS2 has been properly environmentally assessed and properly consulted upon and the appeal hearing has been set for June 10th 2013, so the fight is by no means over.

If the appeal is successful, the Government would have to reassess all alternatives to the current HS2 proposal, undertake an environment assessment for each and then consult on each. Whilst this in itself would not stop the project, the significant increase in timescale and costs would push this past the next General Election in 2015 and hopefully provide additional time for the flaws in the business case and logic for HS2 to be fully exposed and understood. As previously indicated, the second part of the HS2 route to the North was announced on January 28th, and campaign groups are working with local communities along the extended route to help them understand the issues with HS2.

In other news, the Government has revealed that the true cost of HS2 is over £41 billion, as the previouslypublished figure of £33 billion did not include the rolling stock! And finally, it has been conceded that the plans for Euston station, the London terminal for HS2, have had to be scrapped with instead "a shed being bolted on to an existing leanto", according to the Leader of Camden Council.

Mark, the Chef from the Upper School and his catering team, produce fresh, nutritionally balanced meals for the Upper School and many of the local primary schools in the area. The meals are cooked from scratch each morning, using locally sourced produce and then delivered to St. John's school, hot and ready to be served to the children and staff each lunch time.

The work to the kitchen will be carried out over the Whitsun half term and we hope to serve our first meals to the children on Monday 1st July 2013.

In addition to providing school meals for the children we have designed the new kitchen to

# On The Farm

April 25th and at last the grass has grown enough to let some of the cows out to graze. Well yes, there was hail and a bit of snow yesterday, but it didn't settle for long. There are other signs too that spring is underway. A duck with about 10 ducklings was seen proudly watching over her brood as they took to the water on a large puddle in one of the fields. A facility not usually available, flooding not being the norm here on the hills. But then there is always the pond; and one of the farm cats has turned up with five good sized kittens in tow. The chestnut trees are coming out in leaf, and the daffodils are at last with us. The earth has been cold so long, hopefully it will warm up from now on to keep things improving.

The weather continues to dominate the farm, as it always does, but the last twelve months have been trickier than usual.

There is a lot of catching up to do. Very little autumn sown wheat, which is usually our main crop, was planted. Now we will plant spring grown crops. This is second best but better than nothing. Having said that, it is a treat to be able to get on the land again. We have had to replant winter rape as it 100% failed, due to a combination of cold wet weather last September and October and severe slug activity.

It's not just us, many farmers have been patching or replanting crops. Just so anxious to get on and hoping that it will be alright does not always pay off, but you have to take any chance and sooner or later it will work.

Slugs have been in unprecedentedly high numbers for at least a year now, as all keen gardeners will know. We are still having trouble on the winter wheat<br/>which survived the autumn, but<br/>normally should have grown away<br/>from trouble by now. Also all crops<br/>planted this spring, - barley, spring<br/>rape and maize will have to be<br/>watched very closely.Soya bean meal has risen from<br/>£350 tonne to £450, mostly fro<br/>Brazil and Argentina. Brazil has<br/>done most of its harvest, which<br/>reported "good", but the<br/>infrastructure is so poor it cann<br/>get out of the ports. Currently

After last year's poor maize harvest we were hoping for an early turn out for the cows as silage stocks are not huge. Although the ground was dry enough it was only in the last two weeks that the grass has grown sufficiently as it was so cold.

### **Feed prices**

We buy in guite a lot of feed to supplement the cows' diet. Current demand has caused the price to spiral out of control. Much of the feed is waste product from our food. For example, recently Weetabix have shut some of the production lines for its oat products because it cannot source enough oats. Cause: last year's poor oat harvest. In their production process there would always be wastage, which ends up in animal feed. Spent grains from the brewing industry have gone up 60% this winter, if you are able to get them. It would help if people were to drink more beer!

£350 tonne to £450, mostly from Brazil and Argentina. Brazil has done most of its harvest, which is reported "good", but the infrastructure is so poor it cannot get out of the ports. Currently there is a queue of ships waiting to be loaded to export the crop around the world. China has a huge influence. If they are buying the price will change. Timing of contracts is critical. We have bought on contract a good percentage of our feed requirements to April 2014. Time will tell if we have made good decisions.

### **Parlour improvements**

We are in the final stages of our improvements to the milking parlour with some of the technical improvements coming on line. The computer in the office will now record the cows milk yield every time she is milked. Also her activity or lack of activity each day, and the quality of the milk. This will tell us when things change and indicate how she is. We really hope this turns out to be a wise investment.



# Heavenly Bodies

Wonderful Saturn is still prominent in the night sky after reaching this year's closest point to Earth a couple of weeks ago. It's a cinch to spot with the naked eye looking south and using the sky map on this page. Its rings only reveal themselves when using a small telescope, but you'll certainly see the planet's pale yellow colour contrast with the bright white star Spica to its right. These two bodies give a real sense of 3-D in the Universe as Saturn is much closer to us at "only" 846 million miles away, while the star lies a colossal 1,500 trillion miles from us. That's why planets don't "twinkle" like stars whose light has to travel longer distances and is more easily disturbed by Earth's churning atmosphere.

Staying with the planets, three more have a close encounter in our skies around **May 26** (see below). Start near where the Sun sets then look out for a bright 'star' low in the west/north-west sky. That'll be Venus - to the left of it will be Jupiter and above it will be fainter Mercury. In the evenings just before and after the 26th you'll be able to see how each planet shifts position as they pursue their own orbits.

The sky map also shows a good chunk of the summer night sky, so it's a good time to wander outside and see if you can spot one or two of the named stars and pick out some of the constellations. A pair of binoculars will let you look deeper – so how about




finding a globular cluster? Although they sound like a physical ailment, globular clusters are fascinating objects. About 150 of them hover just above our Galaxy in a halo. Looking like a ball of bees, globular clusters are spheres of densely packed stars, bound by gravity.

The best one to see in the northern hemisphere is the Hercules Cluster, shown on the sky map, which can be seen as a fuzzy 'star' in binoculars. I took the image of the cluster shown here using a telescope and a DSLR camera. The cluster lies about 25,000 light years away and is 140 light years wide. Incredibly, it contains about 300,000 stars, so if you lived up there, it would always be daylight. In 1974 a radio beam containing information about the human race, our DNA and Earth's location was beamed towards the cluster from the famous Aricebo radio telescope in Puerto Rico (the one featured in the James Bond film 'GoldenEye'). The beam is travelling at the speed of light, so will reach the Hercules Cluster in 25,000 years' time.

I hope some of you were able to see Comet PANSTARRS in March – sadly, I could not. But do look north for the eerie noctilucent clouds from now on any clear night. If you see silvery-bluewhite clouds glowing in the sky at about 11pm-1am, then you've found them, and are looking at space particles more than 50 miles up. And Comet Ison is getting nearer....
