Dear Editor

I was a bit concerned to read Councillor Molesworth's Parish Council Report in the last edition, saying that the Council own three ponds. As an Ex-Chairman of the Council I am sure it is four.

The one in Kiln Lane with its railings around is a nice place to watch wild life, particularly the Moorhens.

The one at Turnip End is more often than not dry, but with this wet winter it is very full.

At Speen the one in Studridge Lane never was an original Parish Pond. It seemed to be in No Man's Land, so many years ago the Parish Council registered it as Council property. It is overgrown with some nice weeds and grasses.

Long ago, farther around Studridge Lane was Long Pond – never a Parish Pond, now filled in by the owners, but as "kids" eighty years ago, we skated on this pond for many weeks of the winter (yes it used to be cold.)

A few possibly know of the pond along the Pink Road. It is the largest and good for watching wild life, but unfortunately public access is restricted and obscure, so it would be a good idea if the Council were to erect a finger post saying "Parish Pond".

Maybe Hallmark's wild life reporter John Tyler could enlighten us what we can see in and around these ponds. (see page 18 - Ed)

Local Police News

Since 1/1/14 there have been 6 crimes reported in the villages of Lacey Green and Loosley row and 4 of those happened in January. These include an attempted robbery in the early hours of 3/1, two burglaries to houses that happened in the afternoon/evening of 8/1 and 31/1 where cash, jewellery, computer & audio equipment was stolen. There have been two thefts from cars during March whereby specialist tools

were stolen during one and a mobile phone the other.

The area remains very low for crime and anti social behaviour but it is not immune from opportunists passing through so residents are asked to remain vigilant by locking cars, removing valuable items from sight and reporting suspicious activity to the Police on 101 or 999.

This time of year generally sees an increase in motor

crime and shed breaks, a good deterrent for the latter is a padlock that makes a loud noise when tampered with. These can be viewed online or your local NHW coordinator may have some for sale. On The Farm

Spring is here and as soon as the sun came out we felt we were behind with the jobs. Yearly, we roll the grass, spread manure and slurry on the maize ground and prepare the land for planting the Spring cereal crops around the end of April. The crops planted in the autumn also need fertilizing. Then there are fences to check so that the cows can get out into the fields and will stay where they are meant to.

This winter we had many branches and trees blown down and these needed tidying up usually the fence was broken at the same time, as most trees are part of the hedgerow boundaries. So plenty to do.

In March we completed our annual T.B. test. In this timeconsuming procedure all the cattle over 42 days old have to be presented to the vet twice. She injects them on the first day then three days later they have to go before her again to see if there is a swelling reaction indicating that they may have T.B. This is called a reactor and would have to be tested again sixty days later. If the same result is found the animal is culled and as it may still not have T.B. the carcase is examined for confirmation one way or another.

We have never had T.B. We once had a reactor but she passed the next test. We passed this year, no problems. But we look at this disease as "when" rather than "if". We know there was a case in Bishopstone recently so it is not far away.

Anyway we are good for now as T.B. in your herd has serious consequences for selling stock and having to do that double test every sixty days. In the winter this not so difficult as most of the stock is indoors. In the summer the cattle could be in as many as eighteen different fields and it would take ages to round them up and test. As it was it involved everyone on the farm for the best part of two days plus hiring a vet.

Richard, Maxine and daughter Charlotte together with herdsman Ian and wife Sue attended the Bucks Herd Competition Dinner at Winslow. For the first time ever we won two cups, one for best yielding heifer and the other for the "Genus supercow", this based on inspection and performance. A cynic may say it is because most of the other producers have given up but we prefer to think those left know they won't win and we like to think we are improving.

Another annual event, the F.A.B.B.I.man came. Passing this inspection scheme means that when our produce reaches the shops it carries the Red Tractor Logo. It keeps us on our toes and makes farmers improve their practices. Hearts may sink when he rings for an appointment but for the first time ever he left without requesting any improvements, so that was another relief.

Once again we have decided not to run the "Maize Maze". We look on this enterprise as dormant rather than extinct – Hopefully next year!

Thank You - from the District Council

Residents of Chiltern and Wycombe District Council are showing their commitment to recycling and are proving how simple it is to recycle!

Between October and December 2013, under the new recycling and rubbish service, residents have recycled 53% of their waste. Before the start of the new service in April 2013, the recycling rate was 44%.

Recycling your waste reduces the amount of rubbish going to landfill. This means that we have lower disposal costs, are reducing the environmental impact of landfilling waste and helping to preserve the natural resources that would have been used in the manufacture.

Well Done. We are well on the way to reaching our target of 60% recycling by 2015.

To help the council achieve the target of 60% recycling remember that you can use your blue wheelie bin or reusable bag to recycle foil,

cartons, aerosols, glass bottles, glass jars, plastic bottles, food tins, drink cans, plastics pots, tubs and trays.

Residents in Chiltern can still sign up to receive a fortnightly garden waste collection starting for just £35 for the year.

The final phase of the new service is now gradually being introduced to flats and communal developments and this will be completed by the summer.

Windmill Under 5s

It has been another busy and exciting term at Windmills where we have welcomed 12 new joiners.

The main themes this term have been Spring, transport and numbers. On Shrove Tuesday the children had a special snack that consisted of pancakes (of course!) with jam or lemon and sugar. The pancakes were eaten within moments of being brought out!

For Mother's Day the children all decorated flower pots and planted violas to bring home as a surprise for mummy. The children found this very exciting and it is a really lovely way for the children to understand that there is a joy in giving as well as receiving gifts.

We were fortunate to be awarded another technology grant this term and were able to purchase some metal detectors, walkie talkies, phones and a cd player with multiple headphones.

Now the staff and children are looking forward to some nicer weather and sunshine and are planning more excursions to the field and the playground. The teachers are also planning to plant seeds with the children so they can water them and look after the plants as they grow.

Next term the children can also look forward to a visit from an animal lady who will be bringing in some guinea pigs, rabbits, frogs and maybe even lizards, that the children can look at and cuddle, very exciting.

Windmills next big event will be the Family Fun Day on the 29th June, so please keep an eye out for the posters that will be put up shortly.

I can't thank the staff; Paula, Angela, Louisa, Lucy, Annie, Elise and Keely, and the committee and other volunteers enough for all they have done and do every day to make Windmills the stimulating, exciting and wonderful place it is for our children.

Life On The Tops

Everyone who lives on or near the Pennines knows the phrase, 'on the tops', which is literally up on the hill tops of the Pennines, and that's where Alexander found our new home – a Pennine farmhouse dating back to 1624, with an attached barn and five acres of land.

This was in the 1970s, the years of the three day week and power shortages, when the phrase, "share a bath" was more than a joke.

We had been living in the temperate Vale of York in a very modern house on a small estate, surrounded by fertile farmland which consisted of gently rolling arable fields. I mention this setting in particular, because our new home in the Pennines, 'on the tops', could not have been more different in every sense.

Firstly, this spine of England farmhouse was 1,000 ft up the hill, at the end of a long, steep track – no, correction – more like a steep, rough, rocky driedup river bed; but that's for another chapter. Yes, there were neighbours, but they were sensibly down at the bottom of the track.

However, the views were superb on a good day and,

being the 70s, the appeal of living the good life and being partly self-sustained seemed a laudable aim for us and our two daughters. So we set to, firstly purchasing some chickens and ducks before turning our attention to the house and a garden. Not having central heating seemed bearable at first (after all, Alexander and I had grown up without central heating) but, as December set in, we all found we weren't as tough as we thought we were, and none of us could wait to have it installed.

Then we found the situations that can arise from properties that are hundreds of years old. For example, I had never heard of 'capillary action' until the kitchen mysteriously flooded from no apparent source. As it was explained to me during the reparation, because the farmhouse was partly built into the steep hillside, it was 'sucking up' water into the kitchen. This involved Alexander doing a lot of digging and cementing outside (I'm sure I've over-simplified this complicated exercise because. as you may have gathered, I'm not very technically minded) but he succeeded in the end.

Then, every time it rained heavily (which was quite frequently) being on spring water, the spring higher up in the field behind would dam and our water supply would stop, meaning – guess what – poor Alexander would have to go up the hill in the pouring rain, and usually in the dark, to dig yet again to clear it. I'm glad to say he finally invented a method which stopped this happening, much to his relief as you can imagine.

We survived that first winter and learned a lot, and our first summer, 1976, was absolutely amazing. I was lulled into a false sense of rose-coloured glasses, naively thinking that summers were always like this in this part of the country. I had already planned my quarteracre vegetable garden and we looked forward to reaping the harvest, which we truly did during that amazing season. What a bounty we had that year, with a freezer full of vegetables, but little did we know there would be a price to pay during the following Pennine winters.

But more of that another time perhaps

Wildlife Notes

By now ponds all around the villages will be buzzing with activity. One of the first signs of life will have been the return of the frogs, which have spent the winter hidden either at the bottom of the pond or away from the water altogether, but come together again every spring to spawn. The female can lay over a thousand eggs in a matter of seconds, after which her job as a mother is done and she can have the rest of the year off.



Next come the toads, marching as much as a mile under cover of darkness and using their sense of smell to home in on the ponds where they were born. A particularly desirable female will attract several males, who all pile in enthusiastically to form a tight, loudly-squeaking scrum. Sadly, trapped in the middle of all this it is not uncommon for the unfortunate female to be drowned in the process.

Any time now, as we approach the summer, the blues, reds and greens of dragonflies and damselflies will appear, patrolling over the surface of the pond. Whereas frogs and toads must return to the water to breed, dragonflies have to leave it, so by mid-summer plant stems around the pond will be dotted with the empty skins of nymphs that have clambered ashore and burst out as winged adults. Having mated, the male will use special claspers on the tip of his tail to grasp the female by the neck and they will fly off in tandem to search for a suitable spot where she can dip her tail into the water and lay her eggs. Then, mission accomplished, they will both die with the arrival of the first frosts, leaving the nymphs to develop into small but fierce predators. Their jaws are mounted on a hinged arm that they can flick out at lightning speed, rather like a chameleon's tongue, to snatch their prey.

The dragonfly and damselfly nymphs share their pond with unseen hordes of diving beetles, water-fleas, water boatmen and pond snails, many of which will in turn become food for moorhens, wagtails, ducklings and herons.



As in most villages, our oldest ponds are the 'working' ones which were dug a century or two ago to provide the clay for bricks to build the surrounding cottages. Many of these original ponds then carried on working, as watering holes for generations of livestock and villagers, or as somewhere to wet the wheels of farm wagons to stop them drying and shrinking. Most working ponds have long since retired but nowadays they still earn their keep by giving shelter to the creatures that I have already mentioned, and many more besides.

Four of our oldest ponds are owned and protected, on our behalf, by the Parish Council (see details on page 2). Perhaps the best-known and most accessible is Deep Pit Pond in Kiln Lane, where as a schoolboy I stood for countless hours in the summer holidays with a net or a worm on a thread, optimistically fishing for newts.

Sadly though, ponds are themselves becoming an endangered species: in Britain as a whole we have lost three guarters of them in the past century, either by leaving them to become choked with leaves or by actively filling them in because of worries over Health & Safety. Fortunately many of us still have ornamental ponds in our gardens and these can be every bit as rich in wildlife as the old ones, offering a wealth of interest, activity and colour for several months of the year. They are simple to create and very easy to maintain. So if you are lucky enough to have a pond already you should cherish it and congratulate yourself on doing your bit for conservation. And if you haven't yet got one, then now is the time to get digging.

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Constance Baker: 12 July



Early this year we lost our oldest resident, Constance, Connie or Con Baker, who had lived up to her name by being a constant resident of Loosley Row for an amazing 105 years. Spending her whole life in one village, Connie grew up with many people that became life-long friends. However she was just as friendly and welcoming to people who moved here in more recent years.

Connie Gomme's early life was at a cottage by Loosley House, where her mother was a Nurse Maid, and her father, Ralph, was chauffeur, who apparently drove the only car in the village at the time. She first attended the Loosley Row School until it closed, when she moved to St John's School. Many of Connie's early memories make fascinating reading, especially those of her school days, the games she played, and Sundays spent at the Baptist Chapel.

Her father became involved in running Gomme's Forge with his 2 brothers, and their mother Sarah, who lived at Foundry Cottage. In 1933 Connie married Fred Baker. He worked in the furniture industry, but within a year had joined the family's business at the Forge. At that time much of their work was still repairing traction engines and other machinery for local farmers. They had also once employed a millwright, so

undoubtedly worked on the village vegetables at the Annual Show windmill.

During the war, Connie worked in the Forge. Her father, Ralph Gomme, died in 1949 and her husband, Fred Baker, took over running the business. Connie and Fred had 3 children, Graham, Jenny and Geoffrey, who all worked in the family business. She also had four grandchildren and 7 great grandchildren when she died.

Loosley Row Baptist Chapel and its Sunday School were important to the community, and formed a large part of the lives of both Connie and her husband Fred. especially when he became Superintendent, and she was teaching there. After closure in 2001, and the Chapel lying idle for some years. Connie wrote that she was pleased to see it transformed into an elegant dwellina.

After Connie's husband died in 1988, she started exploring the world by going on cruises with friends. More locally, she attended meetings and social events of many groups, but she was always very grateful to the organisers. She even outlived some of the organisations that she belonged to, such as the Afternoon WI and the 81st Club. But she also encouraged new ventures. When Ted Janes founded the Walking Club, Connie was on the first walk, then aged 83. By the Club's 20th Anniversary, they wrote that, at the age of 103, Connie was finding stiles a bit challenging.

She enjoyed her own garden, and was a keen supporter of our Horticultural Society. She attended meetings and social events, insisting on a seat in the front row, for the best view and best chance of hearing the speaker. She also exhibited her flowers (particularly roses) and

until the age of 104.

Connie's childhood memories show a distinct mischievous character, which stayed with her all her life. Nobody would now remember her adventures during her 90 minute long lunch breaks at school. In the 1990s, Connie and Mary Adams, famous for being the village chimney sweep, attended social events together. I well remember them both giggling, like a couple of schoolgirls.

People say that Connie blossomed on reaching 100. She had a celebrity status, often appearing in the local media, and had an eventful life over the last 5 years.

For her 100th birthday, her family took her to London for a day, which included a river cruise and a ride on the London Eye. She arrived for her Birthday Party at the Village Hall in a 1938 Morris. Many relatives from Canada attended, and everybody admired the spectacular 10 piece cake, with 100 candles. The same year she rode on a model train pulled by a steam engine, easily defying those who doubted that she could climb aboard.

At 101 Connie was a model taking part in a WI Fashion Show, and the following year she helped to launch the over-50s Lunch Club. When a splendid Village History Exhibition was held, Connie arrived in a 1954 Rolls Royce to cut the tape for the opening ceremony.

Around 1920 Connie had watched her father on his motorbike at the Kop Hill Climb. So 90 years later she went to the revived event. At 103, she amazed onlookers by calmly climbing the steps onto a tall Steam Carriage. As it was older than Connie it could not drive up Kop Hill, but she enjoyed a ride around the paddock. At the following year's event, Connie

was determined to ride up Kop Hill itself, and was taken up in a modern electric car. Connie was always delighted to see children. As their oldest former pupil, on her recent

Connie was at many events for the Queen's Diamond Jubilee and the 2012 Olympics. She also had many outings by car and coach, with trips to gardens far and wide, including Highgrove and Kew Gardens only a month before she became 105. She particularly enjoyed attending Village Cricket Matches, and was recently described as one of the team's most stalwart supporters.

Besides the organised events, Connie was often taken for more informal trips and meals, keeping a very busy diary. Connie was delighted when people went to see her, or to play Scrabble, and was doubly pleased if you were a man and greeted her with a kiss.

Her keen sense of humour never diminished, but although her hearing and sight deteriorated, Connie enjoyed good health until the last few months, claiming that her long life was due to Black Coffee, Cigarettes, and plenty of Cabbage. But remember that her Grandmother, Sarah Gomme, ran the Forge for many years and lived to be 102.

Connie told me that she enjoyed life since becoming 100, when everyone had made such a fuss of her. I say that she also gave us much pleasure in recent years. She was lucky to have her family's help to enable her to stay in her own home until the last few months.

On the 5th February, around 170 people were at Amersham Crematorium for Connie's funeral. She had said nobody needed to wear dark clothes at her funeral. That reflects the bright, fun loving, sociable nature of her character, which will long be remembered in Loosley Row and Lacey Green, and was reflected in the music played at the Crematorium. Connie was always delighted to see children. As their oldest former pupil, on her recent birthdays St John's schoolchildren sang to her, and wrote "A Song for Connie" for her 105th Birthday. After she died, they adapted some of the words which I read at Connie's Funeral:

Dear Connie was wonderful

Our Special Friend

Dear Connie, you always were such fun

There was nobody like you

And that's why we're glad

You were our Friend.

Anti-Slavery Society - 175th Anniversary

It used to be a self-evident untruth: "Well they abolished slavery, didn't they." It was not even a question. Today there are at least 20 million people in contemporary forms of slavery, and you do not need to go far to find them: young Vietnamese men trafficked as "agricultural labourers". Then with a debt for travel, passport removed and no English.

They are forced to work on growing cannabis in domestic houses in High Wycombe, having committed a crime on day one.....

When Slavery in the British Empire was ended in 1833, by compensating the slave owners with £20 million(!), the slaves were turned into "apprentices" which was little different. This was finally ended in 1839, at which time the British & Foreign Anti-Slavery Society was founded to eradicate the evil world wide. It is now the oldest continuous human rights organisation.

Quite simply, Slavery is recognisable when a person is forced to work by violence or threats, has been bought or sold by an "employer" and is unable to escape.

Slavery meanwhile has metamorphosed over the decades from descent-based slavery which still exists in West Africa, to trafficking in people from Eastern Europe for all kinds of cheap labour, sometimes under illegal gangmasters, or prostitution, bonded labour on the Indian subcontinent. Worst forms of child labour include forced begging and domestic servitude. Early and forced marriage is not yet counted in the statistics.....

So what does the now Anti-Slavery International do?

- Research the data where slavery still exists to prove and document it.
- Work with the UN Raporteur (whose post we helped to create) and ILO to set standards, inspect, name and shame countries internationally.
- Campaign with indigenous anti-slavery organisations to pass legislation outlawing slavery, and enforce the law.
- Support and assist those local organisations worldwide to help the victims escape and re-establish their lives socially and economically.

• Educate and train the police to treat slaves as victims not criminals, with a view to

helping them, and obtaining the evidence against their traffickers.

• Focus on the supply chain of imported goods made under conditions of slavery, such as cotton from Uzbekistan, or textiles from Bangladesh, cocoa from Nigeria or timber from Brazil.

We have a map of 50 goods coming from 29 countries. The pressure point is the retail outlets: do they know what they are selling? Are they (and we) unknowingly part of supporting slavery?

We have a staff of 20 and a budget of £2 millions a year, which has to be raised.

Local resident honoured

March 3rd was a day that Candy Piercy will never forget. She was at Windsor Castle, to be presented with a MBE by the Queen.

Until 10 years ago Candy worked in Westminster for the Lib Dems. She then left and set up her own management training firm.

However she retained her interest in politics and became increasingly involved in training people in developing democracies to take a more effective role in politics and public life. Many of these workshops particularly focused on getting more women elected to Parliament.

Candy has worked for the British Council, the EU, the UN and various NGOs. She has now trained in over 30 countries around the world, from Afghanistan to Zimbabwe. The award of the MBE reflects both her international role and her recent work in the UK to get more women and members of other under-represented groups elected to Parliament.

Candy commented "Seeing for myself the bravery of people who stand for election to Parliament in other countries made me reflect how much we take democracy for granted in the UK.

"It has been a privilege to meet so many fantastic and dedicated people. There were heart warming moments such as when 'The Mothers of Russian Soldiers' burst into song to thank us for coming to work with them to help them stand up to the Russian Government. There were scary moments too - a group of charity workers in Kosovo were threatened with violence for allowing two Serbian women to attend our workshop.

"After one workshop in Cairo the British Embassy confessed that they had been on red alert all week expecting us to be arrested! Thankfully we weren't.



"I was so lucky that the Queen gave me my MBE and that my family were able to be there for the ceremony. She herself is an inspirational figure to women around the world. Another highlight of the day was meeting other people who were being presented awards. It was striking that every one of us felt that our awards also honoured the other amazing people in our teams, who make our work possible."

County Council News

Well it looks as if Spring has finally sprung after the deluge of rain which we have had. This winter, rain has decimated the surfaces of many of our County's roads. We have been inundated with complaints about potholes and although last year an extra £25 million was allocated for road repairs over 2 years with an extra £3 million vied across from Reserves to accelerate this programme, it is not anyway near enough. The Government has agreed to fund BCC with an extra £2.5 million this year following the bad winter weather but in reality we still need about £300 million to invest in our road network in the County alone.

With the flooding a couple months ago Transport for Buckinghamshire were working around the clock to keep water levels as low as possible in a number of areas around the County so now are looking to rectify the damage caused to our roads as soon as possible.

Following 3 years of a County Council freeze on Council tax, we have had to implement a 1.5% increase from April this year. This is due to Central Government reductions in funding to Local Authorities.

Last year an £18 million high speed fibre broadband programme was started for Buckinghamshire jointly with Hertfordshire. The first green roadside cabinet was installed in Butlers Cross last month. Phase one will continue with 30 more roadside cabinets to be upgraded, many in rural areas.

In the local area, I was able to donate funds to support the

local Neighbourhood Action Group, and Lacey Green Parish Council for the repairs to swings in the park through my Community Leaders Fund from Bucks County Council.

I had the great honour of being elected to serve as Chairman of Bucks County Council last May and I cannot believe that my term of office will end on 15th May this year. Time has flown by. One thing that I have found is that there is a huge number of our Community who volunteer and give up their free time to help others who are often less fortunate than themselves. There are equally a large number of volunteers who run vital services within Communities which would otherwise be lost due to cost savings having to be made within Local Government. So if you are one of those unsung heroes, can I thank you most sincerely for what you do within your local area.

Following the success of London 2012 Olympics and Paralympics within the County, with rowing and canoeing at Dorney Lake, and with Stoke Mandeville being the birthplace of the Paralympic movement, I was asked to develop a legacy programme on behalf of the Council. The Bucks Legacy Board was formed in the autumn of 2012 to facilitate that. The Board, of which I am Chairman comprises of Bucks County Council, Aylesbury Vale District Council, Aylesbury Town Council, Bucks Hospital Trust, Leap (formerly Bucks & MK Sport), Wheelpower, BUDS (Bucks Disability Service) Aylesbury College and Bucks Business First.



On 29th August 2013, the anniversary of the start of London 2012 Paralympic Games, an agreement was reached with the International Paralympic Committee. Every 2 years, prior to all future Paralympic games, a Heritage Flame will be lit with a torch relay in Stoke Mandeville . The first relay took place on 1st March 2014 before the Winter Paralympic Games held in Sochi in Russia. This was the very first time that a torch relay occurred outside a host nation. As Chairman of the Board, I had the great honour of taking two torch bearers to Russia for the Games.

Post Office news

It is unfortunate that we lost post office services in March and April. Our new postmaster (Shary) went to India for a family occasion, and whoever had been nominated as his stand-in just didn't turn up. Hopefully, services will have been resumed by the time you read this and we trust that there won't be a repeat performance.

Lacey Green Stores

The stores are still going strong, although we can always use a few more customers, as well as anyone who would like to work behind the counter now and again. We can supply newspapers provided that you order these in advance.

There is a proposal (see below) to operate an on-line library book ordering service in Lacey Green, as a replacement for the mobile library that is currently used by only two people. It may make use of the Stores as a distribution centre, possibly also including an Internet terminal.

The Wycombe District Local Plan

So far as one can tell, Lacey Green is unlikely to be targeted for more housing, whereas Princes Risborough, Bledlow, Saunderton, and Longwick all look more vulnerable. Risborough, in particular has at least three scenarios, the largest involving up to perhaps 3000 properties. This would inevitably have an impact on Lacey Green, for example through increased road traffic.

Recently, a senior member of the Royal Family suggested that villages could each accommodate a small number of houses that would blend with existing properties, and that this would be preferable to larger scale developments elsewhere. My own view is that Lacey Green could certainly accommodate, say, 25 houses, with the locations to be chosen ideally by local residents. This must surely be a better option than some planner elsewhere deciding that we should have 50 houses and choosing the location.

The local plan is required to consider *all* relevant factors across the District, including services, employment, transport and so forth. In theory it should provide the optimum answer to the area's housing needs. So although Princes Risborough looks to be a logical area for significant development, it is only one amongst many options, and isn't necessarily a given. It will be interesting to see what ultimately emerges.

There was a letter in the papers recently from a planning officer who considered that only trained planning officers could make sensible decisions about planning matters and that (untrained) elected councillors should not upset the planner's intentions. Provided you believe that planning qualifications are on a par with other professional qualifications such as those in engineering, then it is a perfectly rational view, even if not very democratic. What do you think?

Heavenly Bodies

As the evenings turn warmer and lighter, the weather may tempt us outside to fire up the barbecue and bask in a sunset or two. As the Sun goes down, and you look into the dying BBQ embers, remind yourself to look up to see a glowing orange nugget, celestial 'bullets' and the Moon illusion.

May is a good month for shooting stars this year, as a regular meteor shower may be followed by a new and possibly more energetic display a few weeks later.

'Shooting stars' are caused by the Earth passing through trails of particles left by comets. The usual Eta Aquarid shower is produced by the trail of Halley's Comet and peaks on **May 6**. Look out for white streaks zooming across the skies as late as you can (especially after the Moon has set), and do the same several nights before and after that date.

The exciting news is that a rare new meteor shower is predicted to hit its peak on **May 24** and could produce a dramatic display. The dust trail Earth goes through has been produced by comet 209P/Linear, only discovered in 2004. It's due to be nearest the Sun on May 6, with Earth slamming into its 'exhaust trail' on May 24. Definitely worth having a look – it could be historic.

The "red planet" Mars graces our skies now and for the next couple of months, but it stays low. Earth is on an inside orbit lap to Mars and overtook it early April when the two planets were 56 million miles apart. Mars is still brighter than most stars, and unmistakably orange to the naked eye.

As planet Earth hurtles further around its own orbit, it leaves Mars behind and 63 million miles away from us by mid-May. The planet gradually becomes smaller and dimmer in our skies over the coming weeks.

You can see where to find it on the sky map shown on this page, along with an image of the planet I've taken. To help further, the Moon will be very close to Mars on **May 10 and 11**, **June 7** and **July 4**. We only get to see it every two years, so it's always good to find it and say you've just seen Mars!

Hot on Mars' heels is the wonderful ringed gas giant Saturn much further out in the Solar System. It too stays low in the sky from our vantage point, and is at its closest to Earth on May 11 when it will be a neighbourly 800 million miles away, but easily seen with the naked eye. It's not quite as bright as Mars during this time, but can be picked out using the sky map and noticing its pale yellow colour. The Moon helps out again by being very close to Saturn on **May 13 and 14**, **June 10** and **July 7**.

Closer to home, and visible most days and nights, is our lovely Moon. Here's something you can try on the nights of **July 10-13** to experience the Moon illusion. The Moon will stay quite close to the horizon on those nights so that you'll see trees, buildings and hills in the same field of view as the Moon. This makes it appear much larger than usual, but is in fact just an optical illusion.

Stretch out your hand and you'll see that the tip of your little finger will cover the Moon, just as it does when the Moon is much higher up in the sky. It's not known for certain why this occurs, but it's something to do with the brain trying to make sense of depth, size and distance when our eyes see the Moon close to Earthly objects. Enjoy!
