She also has some assistance from the management of the Bucks Schools Trust Academy who have been very supportive in these difficult times.

In St. John's Church on Remembrance Weekend



On June 10 we opened our gates to the public, along with hundreds of farms all over the country, with the aim of putting people in touch with where their food comes from. We only promoted it very locally so were very pleased when over 400 people came. We hope people enjoyed their visit. We certainly did, answering the many questions and hopefully giving an insight into modern farming techniques and practices.

There was opportunity to get hands-on with a number of machines. One was a new tractor with only eight hours on the clock (recording hours worked, not miles), another, the combine. On the road this is 4 meters wide and has to trail the header cutter bar. When attached the working width is over 6 meters. People were able to see the cows being milked, the calves being fed and take a trailer ride around some of the fields. Arla, our milk buyer, sent samples of their Skyr style yogurt, milk and lactose free cheeses to try.

We had enormous help on the day from over 40 people, being our staff, friends, family and **Princes Risborough Young** Farmers Club, all of whom gave up their time to help explain and share their agricultural knowledge. Donations left on leaving added up to one hundred and forty pounds which was sent to Local Air Ambulance and the Royal Agricultural Benevolent Institution - thank vou. Open farm Sunday next year is June 9. We are not sure if we will open next year, but if we don't there will be other farms nearby that would be worth visiting.

Also in early June we had a farm visit of 30 farmers from all over the country. This is the group by which we benchmark our costs and farming techniques. It is very useful as they don't hold back in giving advice! Different eyes spot things that have become the norm for us but can be improved.

We are now in a very dry spell with high temperatures which still looks set to continue. It is no



friend to cows. Grass has stopped growing and we are having to feed the cattle in the fields. The younger ones seem content but like to get in the shade in the heat of the day. The milking herd are far more vulnerable to heat stress. A cow's thermal range is between -15 to +25C. If relative humidity increases heat stress sets in at a lower temperature. The cow will then reduce the amount it eats, will be less fertile and reduce milk yield as its energy is redirected from milk production to thermal regulation. Continued on facing page...

Woodway Road Verges

For so many years I have enjoyed the amazing variety of quite outstanding plants contained in the verges on Woodway, particularly the left hand side going up the hill from the 4010, also the right hand side of Little Lane going down towards the main road.

Every Spring, as soon as the really cold weather has finished, little plants begin to appear and a whole collection of spring flowers show their heads. As time passes, more and more varieties show themselves and, if

they are lucky, manage to bloom before the first verge cutting is done. However, summer progresses and new high summer plants appear and by the middle of July there are so many varieties from bedstraws to knapweeds, and mallows bloom happily, making daily shopping trips to Risborough a delight.

I do ask that anyone driving should be very careful not to lose concentration but it is possible to see these lovely things which make us smile and just enrich our day, and remind us how very

lucky we are to live in this glorious part of the Chilterns.

Having said all this, probably this year is the worst for a long time for spotting wild flowers, the heat and the dry make them hurry their programme to get through to setting seed before they parch and die, but they are still there, if briefly; keep your eyes open and remember next vear should be better.

On The Farm Cont'd.....

Crops are ripening quickly and prices are going up as combines are rolling in Europe with yields reportedly down. Maize that we grow to make into silage for next winter's feed which should keep growing to October is looking desperate for lack of rain. As an insurance policy we are sacrificing our spring barley crops to make into silage.

Maxine and Richard went to the annual European Farmers' Congress, this year in Galacia,

northwest Spain, held at Santiago de Compostela, the capital. This ancient city is famous as a place of pilgrimage, serious pilgrims walking hundreds of miles via the "Camino de Santiago" to get there. The area has a mild climate rarely getting above 30C with an average rainfall of over 60 inches. Well suited to dairy farming and the majority of Spain's milk is produced there. There are some impressively managed dairy herds, some of

the highest yielding in Europe. One thing that stood out was the size of the fields, on some farms averaging less than 1 hectare. This is tiny when they farm guite intensively. Because of the climate many fields can be double cropped having crops of grass silage followed by maize for a crop later in the year, after which they plant grass again ready for the next year.

History Society - Famous Residents

The Group has been interested in well known past residents of Lacey Green and Loosley Row. So far we have unearthed over 20 of these who have received some kind of honour. One was knighted for his work on the Abolition of Slavery, and another was once the most famous burglar in the UK. There are also a foundation, various charities, an engineering project and even a horse, which have been famous. A few were born here, but many came to enjoy the peace of the countryside in which to write, compose and paint, and also to retire.

For our Exhibition in November, we shall be celebrating the end of World War One, the Suffragettes, and the Centenary of the RAF. A number of high ranking officers had homes here both during and after World War 2, and some are listed below. Please contact Rosemary Mortham on 01844 345863, if you can provide any information or photographs of those listed below, or any others you may know about. They deserve to be remembered.

1. SIR ARTHUR HARRIS, commonly known as Bomber Harris. He did not live in the parish, but was at Bomber Command, where he was Air Chief Marshall between 1942 and 1945. He was closely involved with the village, and was reputed to have landed a plane on the New Road before it was open to the public.

2. SIR HUGH PUGH LLOYD lived in Church Lane from 1939. In Feb 1950 he was made Air Officer Commander in Chief, Bomber Command. During the war, he was Air Commander in several appointments, including the protection of Malta. 3. ANDREW OLIVER was a leading authority on plywood and adhesives, and gave advice to Sir Geoffrey De Havilland on the development of the Mosquito airplane. He flew from the small airstrip behind the school to inspect any plane which had crashed.

4. LESLIE WILLIAM CANNON moved to Main Road, Lacey Green in retirement. He rose to the rank of Air Vice Marshall. From 1951 to 1955 he was Commander in Chief of the Royal Pakistan Air Force.

5. DONALD FINLAY was a Group Captain, but was better known as the Captain of the British Team in the 1948 Olympics. In retirement he moved to Lacey Green.

6. SIR GEOFFREY HIRST BATEMAN lived at Grymsdyke with his wife Margaret. He was knighted for his services to St. Thomas's Hospital in London, but had risen to the rank of Wing Commander during the war.

We know that there were other local residents, including Mrs Sharland, Mr Croucher, Mr Barcelon, who had prominent roles in the RAF, and we are currently working on them. Our research will be shown at the Exhibition, and will then be included on our newly revamped website, which you will be able to access more easily on your phone.

Please do look this up on the Lacey Green website, under History. You will be amazed by the interesting history of our two seemingly humble villages.

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Wildlife Notes

Even by British standards the year so far has been an odd one, with some parts of the country seeing the driest spring for over a hundred years. This seems to have confused many plants, both in gardens and in the wild, fooling them into flowering as much as a month early. Of course we all know that one of the joys (?) of life in this country is never knowing what the weather is going to throw at us next, and it certainly wouldn't be a good idea to take every hot spell as proof of global warming. (I remember someone pointing out that when the last Labour government came to power the weather suddenly improved!), but there does seem to be growing evidence that our climate is changing. The Woodland Trust hopes to answer the question one way or the other and is appealing to people across the country to report the first and last sightings of particular flowers, birds, bumblebees and berries on their local patch. If you have access to the Internet and would like to help by keeping an eye on our

local wildlife you can find out more by going to www.naturescalendar.org.uk.

Whatever the cause, with luck all that spring warmth, together with plenty of much-needed rain in July, could mean that we will see a bumper harvest of blackberries in local hedgerows this autumn, which is good news not only for crumble-fanciers but for all those animals, including badgers, foxes, wood mice, wasps and butterflies, which enjoy them too. And with plenty of summer rain we might also be able to look forward to a good crop of mushrooms: both the traditional field variety and the much larger and more striking parasol, with its shaggy cap and a collar which can slide up and down the stalk like the ring on a Victorian lady's parasol. It makes good eating, though of course you need to be sure of your identification. There should be plenty of other fungi to look out for too. Last year for example one Lacey Green field (I won't mention which one in case it attracts the wrong sort of attention!) erupted in a miniature



forest of liberty caps: the tiny but famous or infamous 'magic mushroom'. I don't know whether cattle actually eat them, nor whether they are affected in the same hallucinogenic way as humans, but come the autumn it might be worth keeping an eye open for strange behaviour in the local herds!

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Reflections on Two Summer Fetes



The festival of Eid, marking the end of the fasting month of Ramadan, is one of the most important of the Muslim year. Eid is looked forward to and celebrated by our local Muslim communities in Aylesbury and High Wycombe along with their fellow-believers around the world.

In the last few years, the Aylesbury mosque has made a big effort to invite people from all religious traditions and communities in the town to join in their celebrations. A little while ago, I was delighted to join friends from the mosque and beyond in cutting the cake for the Eid Fayre, an event that's rapidly becoming an annual feature of the Aylesbury events calendar.

What I really like is how the Eid Fayre blends two great celebratory traditions: Eid, with its significance to Muslims, and the English love of summer fetes and favres. I actually went to both the Eid Fayre and the Speen village fete on the same day (and just caught the end of the Risborough festival too!) and was struck by the similarities. Both had stalls fundraising for charity and others promoting local public services and voluntary organisations. Both were selling food and drink. Both had children's activities. Oh, and both had lots of people cheering on England in their quarter-final game.

Yes, there were some differences: there was no alcohol and no raffle at the Eid Fayre. But the mood at both was the same: a local community coming together to enjoy themselves and inviting the neighbours to join them. I went home that evening thinking that, whatever our problems and challenges, there are some things in this country that we are getting right. Of course we need to do a lot more to make sure that we as a country get the right balance between national unity and solidarity and respect for the diversity that is a key feature of modern England and modern Britain, but that Saturday afternoon in July renewed my optimism about the future.

Update on local government reform

The public consultation has closed on the government's "minded to" proposal to accept the plan for a single unitary council in Buckinghamshire to replace both County and District Councils. Due process needs to be observed, but I have urged the new Secretary of State, James Brokenshire, to make his decision as soon as possible.

Princes Centre

Our next project is the refurbishment of the kitchen area, due to start in the middle of September which will include the laying of a new floor, new cupboards and the replacement of some of the older appliances. Another project in the offing is one being sponsored by the Risborough Rotary Club and involves some landscaping of an unused external area and the construction of a shed for the use by the Centre as well as one for their use for storage of equipment. Some clients were taken to see the recent Flower Festival at St Dunstan's Church. Some others have been to Thame Market, or to Peterley Manor Farm to pick strawberries. Four of the staff have kindly volunteered to take a group of clients for a day trip to Southend later this month.

Parish Council

Lacey Green, (which includes Loosely Row and Speen) is a civil Parish, and as such has a Parish Council - which is the first tier of local government. The Council is an elected body and a Parish Councillor's term lasts for 4 years. If a vacancy occurs, the Parish Council has a duty to co-opt someone to fill the vacancy, but where the number of candidates is the same as, or fewer than, the number of vacancies, no election is required. The number of councillors varies with the size of the Parish.

Lacey Green should have 7 councillors but currently there are only 5, so two vacancies exist for residents of the Parish to put their names forward to become a Parish Councillor. If you have ever thought about finding out how your Parish is run, do get in touch- we'd like to have you on board!

Lacey Green Parish Council is empowered to raise money for its activities through a tax, called a Precept, which is collected on its behalf by Wycombe District Council as part of your council tax. The Parish Council cannot spend money except on projects or actions for which it has statutory powers, but does have power to provide some facilities itself, which it has done for example the children's play area, bus shelters and seats, and looking after the ponds.

Even in the middle of a heat wave, the Parish Council is already looking ahead towards the autumn and winter and that means <u>Estimates</u> - when we decide what the expenditure will be for the next financial year 2019-2020 from the Precept. To help us in this, if there is an organization in the Parish which would like a boost to their funds for a project that is planned, please submit a letter to the Council together with a copy of the current year's accounts by the end of October, or sooner if possible. This way the Council can plan and distribute funds accordingly.

We are delighted that after some delays caused by waterlogging over the Easter period, the upgrades to the playground are complete. The playground now has a bespoke slide unit, new bucket swing, see saw and roundabout, plus a shelter. The existing swings have been repaired and painted. It is lovely to hear the whoops of joy from the children enjoying the new playground.



The Parish Council is invited by the District Council to comment on applications for planning consent in its area. If you are concerned about any proposed planning permission you can voice your concerns at a Parish Council meeting.

All Parish Council meetings are public, and are advertised in advance on noticeboards and on the website, so that members of the public can attend if they wish. Our Chairman allows members of the public to address the meeting at the beginning of each council meeting, if they want to do so. Comments made by members of the public at this time do not form part of the formal meeting and will not be minuted. We do however consider all comments made by the public when making our comments on planning applications to the District Council and will offer our support to objections where we believe it is in the best interest of the parish.

Following the retirements of Sue Griffiths our clerk for ten years, and Jayne Mylchreest, who succeeded her a year or so ago, we have a new Clerk for the Parish Council, Frank Post, who is also clerk to Aston Abbotts near Wingrave, north of Aylesbury. Frank is very knowledgeable in Council matters, and is already studying to become a Qualified Clerk. You may remember that Sue Griffiths, was Clerk of the Year some years ago - a huge achievement!

We are aware that many parishioners are concerned about the state of the roads. You can report any potholes which have escaped repair via the website <u>www.fixmystreet.com</u> and the same website can be used to report broken pavements, weeds on footpaths, missing or broken signs, flytipping, etc. Just follow the instructions on the site, and identify the location of the problem, preferably with a postcode, or road name.

Horticultural Society

Society has a web site which also describes how to grow them. Well worth looking at.

With an increasing interest from young people in gardening and growing your own vegetables it has been noted by the committee that the allotments in Westlands appear to be underused. In the past we have received queries about these allotments but they are not the province of the horticultural society. I wonder if their presence could be more widely publicized, perhaps through the pages of Hallmark?

We have had some excellent talks recently, the last with amazing photographs of wildlife that we can attract to our gardens. The images were so sharp and clear that it was almost better than seeing them in real life! 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District Council



Local Plan

The Wycombe District Local Plan was submitted to the Planning Inspectorate in March 2018 for Examination.

The Inspector has now begun the formal process of considering the content and also the submissions from the different groups who have objected to the choice of the proposed sites for additional new homes to be constructed.

We await the Inspector's report that may accept the Local Plan in its entirety as proposed, include recommendations for changes or possibly reject it.

Relief road funding

In the meantime the District Council has submitted bids to Government for funds to fast track the design of two sections of the southern end of the relief road around Risborough.

Notification that the bid was successful was received in February 2018 and then some time later, put on hold pending a request for further details.

Subsequently at the Cabinet meeting on 4th June some funding from reserves to commence the design work was approved.

This plainly demonstrates the determination of the Council to move the delivery of the Local Plan project forward in Princes Risborough and elsewhere in the District.

Risborough Springs

Plans for the Risborough Springs Leisure Centre are progressing well. The design that looks very good is agreed in principle and the submission for Planning Approval will be made in July.

The next stage is to begin the tender process in the autumn with the work commencing on site soon afterwards. The plan allows for the Leisure Centre to remain open throughout the construction stage. When completed there will be a new reception and a much larger area for the gym and other 'dry' activities.

Speen broadband

Fibre linked broadband has arrived in the cabinet that serves Speen at last! The BT guarantee is that it will provide download speeds of 50 Mbps and that will be wonderful as I currently struggle with about 3Mbps. This upgrade was made possible in the rural areas with a subsidy from both BCC and WDC. The Bryants Bottom cabinet is next in line.....

Horses Trust

Finally, a plug for the outstanding Horse Trust charity in Speen that deserves support.

Permission has been granted for much carefully designed upgrading and improvement work on the site in recent years with some already delivered and some still to be constructed.

I have made several visits recently and it looks stunning with its 100 horses, ponies and donkeys enjoying 200 acres of immaculate and very rare chalk grassland so if you are looking for something to do one afternoon here is a suggestion. There is afternoon tea and cake and Beachdean ice cream on offer too.

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Heavenly Bodies

By this time tomorrow, you'll have travelled 1.6 million miles through space at over 66,000mph. Over the next six months, planet Earth will take you halfway around the Sun, chalking up 300 million miles. So as we hurtle along, our view of space from Earth is always changing – different constellations come into view, pass by, and are followed by other constellations.

Highlights of what will be on show from August to January 2019 also include comets, 'shooting stars', planets – and a Supermoon and lunar eclipse on the same night!

August hosts one of the best meteor showers of the year - the Perseids which peak on the night of the 12/13th with no moon to spoil it. Look out for 'shooting stars' streaking across the sky as dust particles left by Comet Swift-Tuttle burn up in our atmosphere. Jupiter, Saturn and Mars will also be low near the southern horizon. There is also a comet thundering towards the Sun which should be visible in binoculars this month - and even the naked eye in the next few weeks. Comet 21P/Giacobini-Zinner will be near the bright star Capella by the end of the month. You can track it, or anything else mentioned in this column, via the website https://theskylive.com

Venus has been prominent in the western skies after sunset but slowly fades into the twilight. Jupiter disappears under the horizon at about 10.30pm, leaving Saturn and Mars in the night sky (see February's edition). **September** should be the best month to see Comet GiacobiniZinner (in the Auriga/Gemini constellations) – especially on the 10th as it is just outside the Earth's orbit. If it becomes visible with the naked eye, it could make a headline or two in the news.

Another meteor shower, the Draconids, are due on the 8/9th of **October**, and their rather weak display could be boosted by the dust left by Comet Giacobini-Zinner. Some of my favourite constellations are also starting to look their best – Perseus and Cassiopeia, with the gorgeous Double Cluster in between (see chart and image).

November introduces us to another comet – 46P/Comet Wirtanen – which could also reach naked-eye visibility. Binoculars should pick it out low in the southern horizon, as the comet travels 'up' in our skies. The Leonid meteor shower on 17/18th November should be a good one. The bright 'star' in the east before sunrise is Venus, having travelled around the other side of the Sun since August. December brings the potentially fantastic Geminid meteor shower on the 13/14th as well as Comet Wirtanen which could be spectacular. It becomes brightest around mid-December when it is near the Pleiades ('Seven Sisters') cluster, and by the bright star Capella on Christmas Day. If it 'behaves' (comets are very uncooperative) the views should be jaw-dropping.

Once the New Year's celebrations subside, the Quarantid meteor shower could give a very good display on 3/4th January. Our epic journey is capped off by a Total Lunar Eclipse on the morning of the 21st when the Moon will also be larger than usual (a so-called Supermoon). As the eclipse takes place between 3.30-6.50am, plan ahead or watch reports on the morning TV news!
