

On the Farm

I always seem to write about the weather. So this article I decided not to write about the 15+ inches of rain since September and the effects of it. I am not going to write about the waterlogged fields, the fact we have planted about 3/4 of the area of wheat we intended to plant and half of that is waterlogged and has probably rotted rather than grown. I will not write about the extra amount of slurry and not being able to cart manure out to fields without dragging mud on to the road. I cannot remember it being quite so wet, hopefully a dry spell is just around the corner. The nights are drawing out and it feels like we're on the right side of the shortest day.

On the positive side we did manage to establish over 100 acres of new grass leys before the rain started, these look well. These will be kept for two seasons to be cut regularly to make silage for the dairy cows over the winter. We have sold all the arable crops that we produced last year. It was mostly milling wheat that we sold to Heygates at Tring to make into flour. Every load passed for quality with particularly high protein levels, this is the effect of sunny weather last June and July when the grain was forming and ripening. The milk price paid by ARLA our milk buyer has remained remarkably stable considering the UK had one of its most productive years in 2019 for milk production.

People who walk the footpaths behind the farm may have seen our wild bird feeders that are about the farm. These are part of the farm cluster group's activities. 17 farms in the local area have taken about ½ tonne of bird seed each to feed birds to help them through winter, and hope to increase the diversity of the bird population on the farm and in the area. The Bucks Owl and Raptor Group (BORG) are also going onto the farm putting up owl boxes, we are expecting them on farm before long. In 2019 75 species of birds have been recorded in the cluster group. The Hughenden ringing group have set up a long term ringing project on 3 of the farms, aiming to net and ring birds once a month between November and April across the 5 years of the project. See pictures of a corn bunting and a yellow hammer.

During the winter nearly all our cattle are housed. We have one group of beef cross yearlings out on stubble turnips (stubble turnips are established after a cereal crop and used before a spring crop, like maize, is planted) and a little grass, which is ok on free draining ground. We also have some sheep on the farm, this is helping someone out who has not managed to establish stubble turnips last summer as it was so dry and they are short of keep. These are pregnant ewes, they do a good job of reducing grass cover without treading up the ground. As we don't usually have sheep, most of our fields do not have sheep proof fields, so temporary fencing has to be put

We are also doing some management on some of our hedges, where elder is taking over. We are taking it out and replacing it with hawthorn and holly which makes a better stockproof hedge in due course.

Farming is often affected by political decisions. The new agricultural bill is about to be



reintroduced. This will be a significant piece of legislation that will have guite an effect on the direction of UK agriculture for the next few decades. Hot on its heels will be the new Environmental Bill which will no doubt also have implications for agriculture particularly in relation to soil, air and water quality. It feels like as we move into a new decade we are moving into a new farming era, presumably we will leave Europe and go away from the Common Agricultural Policy. It is difficult to predict where we will be by the end of the decade. Hopefully still producing foods for people who like to consume them, but this may not the case, food maybe produced out of thin air and created in factories by then...

When in Lacey Green - Drive like Miss Daisy!

Some of you may have noticed the Movable Vehicle Activated Sign (MVAS) that has been rotated in 8 locations in Lacey green, Loosley Row and Speen in recent months. It's part of a speed monitoring programme the Parish Council have been conducting over the last year.

The unit serves two primary purposes - one is to flash the speed limit to drivers who may not be aware as they pass through the village at a speed higher than the 30mph limit, and the other is to capture speed data. It is not a speed camera, so it doesn't take pictures of cars!

An additional benefit is that it also captures data on the amount of traffic passing through the village. Since the unit has been in operation we have been able to analyse the data. Highlights are:

- On average per week 15,000

 17,000 vehicles go through
 Main Road, Lacey Green,
 with over 40% (that's 6,000 cars) traveling at 35mph or
 more when passing Slad
 Lane. Of this figure over 400 drivers a week are recorded as traveling over 45 MPH!
- Over 1,000 cars per week travel at over 40mph coming up to the Whip Inn crossroads, heading towards Princes Risborough
- 3,000 go through Speen with 7% over 35mph
- 4,000 go up Pink Road, where the speed limit is 40mph. 15% of drivers passed the entrance to Widmer Feeds @ 45MPH or over.

 Speeding is not limited to a time of day, however between the hours of 8-9 am in the week the speeds at Main Road are reduced due to the congestion around the school at this time – which as we know presents a different set of problems.

We have now purchased a second unit for long term placements at St John's School and just before the crossroad at The Whip heading into Risborough.

We hope that the flashing speed limit and request to slow down will help to remind drivers to reduce their speed when coming into the village.

We have also passed our data to the relevant authorities for consideration as to whether any further activity is required in the speeding hot spots.

Lastly, thanks to our volunteers, Charles Mitchell and Shelley Jennings who have been willing to help, through rain wind or shine, to ensure the unit is in the right place and fully maintained. Our thanks too to Paddy Woods Ballard whose skilled analysis work brings this all to life. It would not have been possible without them all.

Road markings and signage review

In addition we have been working with Transport For Bucks to address the problems on the Main Road including:

- The markings outside St John's School where the school bus parks are incorrect/in the wrong place.
- The dragon's teeth and roundels entering the village from either end have been tarmaced over and not repainted.
- Parking at the junction of Kiln Lane and Main Road, the junction of Slad Lane and Main Road and along Main Road on the bend between the School and Slad Lane.
- How to encourage parents to use the Village Hall and Village Pub car parks that have been so generously offered for use at drop off times.

All of the above and more are being put together in a consultation document that will be presented by TfB for all to comment on. As soon as we receive it, we will post it on the Lacey Green Parish Council website and also on the Lacey Green & Loosley Row website for your comments.

We hope that you, the readers and residents of the village are pleased with the efforts that your Parish Council is making towards managing both the speed of traffic and parking of vehicles within the village. If you have any comments please email the clerk.

Nordic Walking





I realise that a lot of residents in Lacey Green and Loosley Row walk for a variety of reasons; being part of local established walking groups, to make the most of the countryside and wonderful views, or walking the dog. I wanted to provide a different dimension - that of Nordic Walking.

Nordic Walking is an enhancement of ordinary walking – it makes something we can all do... twice as effective! Nordic Walking uses poles to in order to add two major benefits to walking. The use of poles means the upper body muscles are used as well as the legs. The poles help to propel the walker along – this means he/she works harder than usual yet the support given by the poles makes it feel easier!

Nordic Walking is a specific fitness technique and is not to be confused with trekking, hill walking or trail running as the poles are not planted in front of the walker/runner but in a specific way that increases the use of the upper body.

It can be done by anybody, anywhere and does not require expensive equipment or clothing. There are several of us who already nordic walk and can vouch for the benefits. One Lacey Green resident tells me that having joined a group in Princes Risborough she felt much better after a few weeks and it improved her stability.


As we get older, we begin to lose muscle and bone strength which can affect our balance and our balance gets worse. Muscle weakness and poor balance are also the two most common modifiable risk factors for falls, which can lead to injuries like hip fractures and make us more likely to end up in hospital or to need social care. Nordic walking will help with maintaining muscle strength and improving stability. The social aspect is fantastic and a really good way to meet like minded people. What more do you want than a chat while taking in the sights and sounds of the Chilterns.



I Nordic walk with 'Harmony Nordic Walking' a group based in and around High Wycombe and led by Adele Howlett. There are many walks throughout the week, fast walks covering about 5 miles to medium and slower paced walks for those new to nordic walking or inactive or new to exercise or older people. I also help with a weekly 45 minute gentle walk in Princes Risborough which aims to build up confidence and improve health. There is also a 10 minute session of Tai Chi Movements for Wellbeing, a specially-developed sequence of movements which promotes physical and emotional wellbeing.

History Group

The Local History Group held an exhibition last November at the school. We were very glad to have so many visitors, nearly all in the afternoon it has to be admitted, as the odds were stacked against us. The date clashed with the annual art exhibition, coffee and lunch in the village hall, and the final of the Rugby World Cup in the morning. Then to make matters worse the weather was atrocious. I've often said that our villages turn up trumps when it comes to giving support. It did. We appreciated it.

We showed: DVD's from our collection of Village Day Processions, Sheaf to Loaf Day, and Street Parties, to name but a few; old photographs from our collection; reports of research on numerous subjects; local family trees, some going back into the 1700s; maps from 1700s and the Enclosures Act 1823.

A group from Loosley Row complained bitterly to me that Loosley Row had lost many important places in favour of Lacey Green. They cited things like the Windmill, the Church, the Village Hall, the Post Offices, the grocery stores, the pubs. It looked like they had a good point. However it was not a conspiracy of Lacey Green's.

Most of the changes occurred because of the enclosures of the Manor of Princes Risborough of 1823. The Manor was a massive estate that stretched from beyond Longwick to include Loosley Row, Lacey Green and Speen. It belonged to the Lord of the Manor, a privately wealthy man. It had belonged to the crown from before William the



Conquerer until King Charles I overspent himself and sold us off. All the land and cottages were tenanted and run in a medieval system.

Loosley Row was established long before Lacey Green. The land was more fertile, being lower and much of it was made into farms. The remainder was divided into arable strips. allocated out by the Manor which controlled everything. Lacey Green mostly consisted of a vast common for the use of Princes Risborough to graze their cattle. Not for the use of Lacey Green. There was no running water in Lacey Green. There were a few farms. There were vast areas of parish woodland where people could collect fallen wood. The main track (road) was from Speen along Highwood Bottom to the pond behind Windmill Farm then down to Woodway. The only building on the Common was the Windmill. There were no through roads in Lacey Green, just tracks between the handful of houses.

In 1823 the Enclosure of the Manor of Princes Risborough

was passed in parliament and all the land was divided up and became privately owned. The commissioners designated new roads so every property could be accessed. One result of the new roads was that the windmill was now in Lacey Green not in Loosley Row as the road was the boundary between the two villages.

With the roads now established all over Lacey Green and the massive common divided into fields and suitable for building, and the woods privately owned the village grew rapidly. It was relatively flat as opposed to most of Loosley Row which was on an escarpment. The flatter land consisted of farms. The first Post Offices, shops and pubs were in Loosley Row but from 1823 nearly all the new building was in Lacey Green often created by people living in Loosley Row.

Now in 2020 the only new building possible is extension, replacement or infilling in what had been obligatory garden designated in 1823.

It's time for some 20-20 night vision! Supermoons and spectacular planets will grace the constellations for the next six months, topped off by the majestic Milky Way in the summer.

February: You may have already noticed a brilliant 'evening star' in the southwest sky just after sunset. This is in fact the planet Venus which glows brighter and moves higher over the next few weeks, appearing to blaze away in the evening sky. On the 9th, the first of four 'supermoons' appears – though April's is the best. Look out for the poetic pairing of the Moon and Venus from the 26th-28th. They re-visit each other around the same date during the next few months.

March: Another supermoon on the 9th! The spring equinox on the 20th is followed by delicious views of the Moon and Venus wafting near the 'Seven Sisters' (Pleiades) star cluster and through Taurus on the 28th and 29th.

April: If the skies stay clear on the 3rd, there will be a magical sight of Venus nestled within the 'Seven Sisters'. I've never seen

this before and think it is quite rare. It should look amazing (about 9pm). Five days later, on the 8th it's time for this year's biggest and brightest supermoon to shine. This one will be a massive 30% brighter than fainter full Moons – at just 357,000km away. It's worth looking out for some dramatic shooting stars on the night of the 21st/22nd as the Lyrid meteor shower is given a moonless sky.

May: This year's final supermoon is on display on the 7th. Fast-forward to the 21st, look for Venus just after sunset and see if you can spot tiny Mercury below it. At the same time the next day, eagle-eyed gazers will see that Mercury has moved to the right of Venus.

June: Saturn and Jupiter have been steadily swinging into view as the Earth catches up with them. They stay low in the southern sky and don't rise until late. If you really want to see them close together, you'll need to be up at 1am on the 9thwhen they will be above the Moon (Jupiter is the brighter of the two and will be to the right of Saturn).

July: If you missed the gas giants in June, see them again on the 5th (slightly earlier at 11.30pm) when the Moon will act as a 'pointer' and be below them again. Both planets are at their closest to Earth ('opposition') this month.

During the summer, one of my favourite sights is at its best - the Milky Way (see picture above *that I captured*). Seeing the soft glow of our galaxy helps put our location in some sort of perspective. The ribbon of tightlypacked stars mottled by huge clouds of gas and dust is aweinspiring. These are just a fraction of the 200-300 billion other stars in our galaxy, and it now seems likely that most of them have their own planets orbiting them. Perhaps someone or something is looking at the Milky Way back in our direction not noticing our Sun as it is drowned out by all the stars.

Watch out for August's edition of Hallmark when the Red Planet visits our skies for the first time in two years.

Weekend Away, 6 Oct

The ducks are exceptionally tame and present a good photo opportunity.

Dinner on Monday night included watercress soup – what else?

Following check-out on Tuesday morning, the group visited Hinton Ampner house and estate. This National Trust house is a time capsule of the 1930s and well worth a visit. The group found it fascinating.

Those who managed to avoid the temptations of the cafe undertook a three mile walk through the estate while enjoying great views over the South Downs. The walkers then reached Kilmeston hamlet and returned via Hinton Ampner village, close to the site of the Civil War battle of Cheriton.

District Council News

At close of play on Tuesday 31st March, Wycombe District Council will cease to exist, along with the County Council and the other District Councils in Bucks. On the morning of April Fool's Day, the brand new Buckinghamshire Council will emerge into the sunlight blinking, and seamlessly take on all the duties of local government as a Unitary Council based in Aylesbury. There will be some new names alongside the many excellent long serving officers who have been chosen to run the new authority.

Similarly, the District and County Councillors remain in place until 31st March and will be available after that date to deal with ongoing matters only until the election. The election for the 147 councillors for the new Council, 3 for each of the 49 wards, will be on Thursday May 7.

In practice, all the existing Council offices around Bucks will be open for business as usual on 1st April. It will take some time for the various departments to be merged into their planned 'slimmed down' format and the full reorganisation completed so don't expect to see too many immediate changes.

I have been honoured to work as your elected member for the Lacey Green, Speen and the Hampdens ward for the past term of nearly 5 years. For the first 2 years, I also served as Deputy to the Cabinet Member for Finance followed by the role of Cabinet Member for Community Services.

Part of the current ward will be in Ridgeway West and part in Ridgeway East and as I will not be standing in the election for either of these wards, please forgive the indulgence in looking back at the progress that has been made by your District Council in the current term. The members kept tight control of the element of Council Tax reserved for running WDC with only two tax rises in the last 10 years, so that Wycombe has the lowest Council Tax in Bucks and one of the lowest in the entire country.

This has been achieved by careful management of costs and an excellent record of making prudent long term investments in property in the District that give a good return on capital employed. This has allowed further investments and upgrades to facilities from existing resources without recourse to borrowing. Your council remains debt free, a notable achievement.

Examples of capital projects planned include the Risborough Springs Leisure Centre extension that is now open, the Court Garden Leisure Centre refurbishment that is under way, the new Rye Boathouse project that will be completed in early summer, planned work on the new cemetery at Hazlemere that will commence in the spring, purchase of the Brunel Shed by Wycombe Station for

refurbishment and extension and purchase of some unoccupied shops in the town centre for refurbishment and letting.

We now have street wardens in Wycombe town centre that has much improved the management of the area. There are many other examples of forward thinking projects that are under way or have been completed recently.

Locally on planning matters, a handful of new houses have been approved and some completed, many extensions approved and a number of enforcement notices issued. The collection of waste has generally been satisfactory, green bin emptying remains charge free. Open spaces owned by WDC have been well kept, retaining the coveted Green Flag status for Hughenden, the Rye and Higginson Park. Traveller incursion in the parks was a problem for a while until an injunction was won at High Court.

There have been a few occasional glitches in service levels, apologies for that, but usually they are resolved quickly to the satisfaction of most. Pot holes are a matter for BCC!
