Preservation Orders.


In February this year a gale removed a large limb which threatened the electricity supply and motorists.

History Walk Around Lacey Green

TO CELEBRATE THE QUEEN'S PLATINUM JUBILEE

ON SUNDAY 5TH JUNE FROM 2.30.P.M.

STARTING AT ST. JOHN'S CHURCH

This will be a walk around the older parts of the village from Grimsdyke House to the Windmill, including Church Lane and Kiln Lane, led by members of the Local History Group.

There will be no charge, but donations to the church will be very welcome. Interested residents should assemble in the church, where there will be a small exhibition of Royal Memorabilia related to Queen Elizabeth 2nd.

In the event of very bad weather, a short talk will be given instead.



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On the Farm

In March we were able to turn out our in-calf heifers after a winter in the barns, which causes great excitement amongst them. They have had a few wintry days since but on average they prefer to be out. The grass must be growing a bit more consistently for the cows to go out and it needs to be a little bit warmer for last autumn's calves.

We have got to do a six-month TB Test in mid-May, which involves presenting them to the TB technician or vet twice, 3 days apart. They must be in the yard at that point to handle them safely, so this doesn't encourage taking them too far away at the end of April only to have to gather them in two weeks later.

The end of April is always a busy time as we are trying to spread manure and then create seed beds to plant maize. Maize requires the soil to be 10 degrees to germinate and doesn't like frost once it has emerged. So it's usually best planted around the last week of April. We have fertilised and rolled our silage leys which will be ready for the first cut around the end of May.

Red Tractor Audit

In the last week of April we have an annual Red Tractor Audit looking at our cereal production and beef cattle production. In mid-May we have our annual red tractor Dairy Audit. Without the red tractor Áudit certification, we would be virtually unable to sell our produce, so it is important. A farm that recently featured on Panorama had its red tractor certificate removed. As far as I know the cows have been sold and the farm has ceased milk production.

Dairy farming is a routine business. If you are a person that likes routine and a physical outdoor life, dairy farming could be for you. There are many daily routines like feeding, cleaning, bedding, milking.

There are weekly routines like Vet fertility and cow health visits. At least once a month a professional cow chiropodist comes to trim cows' feet (the aim is the cows have their feet trimmed twice a year), to prevent any lameness.

Every month we do milk recording which involves taking a sample of milk from every cow which is then sent away to be analysed for butterfat, protein levels and health quality.


Although the routine is similar every day, it gradually changes throughout the year as the seasons change. This spring and summer we have several workexperience students coming who are studying at Berkshire college of agriculture; and later in the year we have some vet students coming for a week of dairy experience. These guys are the future for our industry, so we try to give them the experience if possible.

Ukraine

We mentioned in the last article the cost of farming going up, which will inevitably cause production to be reduced, pushing consumer prices up. Since then, the awful situation in Ukraine has happened. This has made a tough situation worse, with production costs leaping again.

Ukraine accounts for about 10% of global trade in grains and oil seeds like sunflower and oil seed rape for vegetable oils. In 2021 11% of our vegetable oils were imported from Ukraine. Unlike the UK Ukraine didn't ban the use of nicotinoid seed dressings, which reduced the UK's output. Between 2011 and 2015 UK averaged 2.5 million tonnes production, this year the production is predicted to be 1 million tonnes, so we now rely on more imported oilseeds.

At this time of year Ukrainian farmers would normally be planting most of their crops, it's



difficult to imagine much being achieved in some areas. Recently the EU parliament agricultural commissioners have acknowledged there isn't currently a food security threat however they are discussing ways for the EU to boost its food production. Which is good news as we import over 40% of the food we consume.

Meanwhile DEFRA doesn't believe there will be any problems (until the shelves are empty) as we have a good domestic agricultural industry that is good at absorbing costs (apparently); also we are a wealthy nation that can afford to import food. However, there is so much pressure in fertiliser and feed prices and availability; and labour shortages within the industry, so we will see how it unfolds.

We had a bird survey done by a volunteer organised by the cluster group in February. Over the whole cluster area 77 species of bird were spotted and on our farm 55 species were recorded, which was pleasing. We also had a meeting with several other local cluster groups. This was very interesting, and we came away feeling our cluster was leading the way in many ways.

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Stoke Mandeville support

Many of you will remember the launch of the Lacey Green and Loosley Row Community Action Group's appeal for comforts for the hardworking, dedicated staff of our NHS. Members of both community groups attended the official opening on 6th April.

We had contacted the Acts of Kindness Team at Stoke Mandeville Hospital in 2020 at the start of the pandemic and they suggested the greatest need at that time was for the supply of bottled drinking water and individual snacks for staff working long shifts wearing PPE.

We launched a local appeal and within two weeks had raised our target of £2,500. With generous support from Dayla, Aylesbury, who supplied and delivered over 1500 bottles of water at cost, we were able to target help where it was needed. We also relied heavily on the staff at the local Asda who supplied and delivered snack bars and hand and face cream; as well as personnel from RAF Halton who provided further items from Costco and delivered to Stoke Mandeville.

We were in lockdown and accessing goods without the help of these groups would have been impossible. We supplied over £1,000 worth of refreshments at this time.

We also received an urgent request to supply equipment bags for staff to safely store their PPE, and the Loosley Row sewing group, although busy making protective gowns, also found time to make over 40 cloth equipment bags which were gifted to the hospital within 2 weeks of the request.

Eventually needs changed and we were asked to stop supplying drinks and snacks. We still had funds from our fundraising and following further discussions with the Acts of Kindness Team it was agreed that a benefit to the staff would be some garden furniture. After a site visit, a secluded location accessed only by hospital staff, was identified and a plan agreed to provide garden furniture.

This prompted a further round of fundraising and thanks to the most generous support from Princes Risborough Rotary Club and Loosley Row Gardening Group who raised a further £600 from a plant sale, we were able to commission 4 picnic benches, 5 garden benches and 4 planters from Lindengate mental health charity in Wendover.

Lindengate worked closely with us to provide bespoke and high quality garden equipment that will last for many years. They are happy to take orders for garden furniture, trees and plants and can be contacted via anne.mills@lindengate.org.uk

Thank you to everyone who supported this appeal. We hope to continue to help where needed, especially as we welcome families from Ukraine into our communities.

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Ukraine to UK

We have all seen the terrible ravages of war inflicted on Ukraine and the resulting mass exodus of Ukrainian families to their neighbouring countries. None of us can truly imagine the horror of being forced to leave our homes, loved ones and our country, not knowing what the future holds or if, when, we can return.

When the government announced that they were opening up the refugee scheme, to allow any Ukrainian, with a UK resident sponsor, to come to the UK for up to 3 years, the local response was truly incredible.

Our villages, along with Speen, Princes Risborough, Great Missenden, Monks Risborough and Radnage, are sponsoring 40 family groups at last count, this is in excess of 115 individuals of all ages. Our youngest visitor is just two months.

We are determined to work together as a community to support both our generous host families and the Ukrainian families, who will be staying in the Chilterns until it is safe for them to return to their homes. Please visit our website for more information.

Through Daniel, a friend of the Thomas-Davies family in Loosley Row, we have made contact and sponsored many families. Daniel is a Russian speaker and has been invaluable in supporting the host families to communicate with the sponsored families and fill in the myriad forms to apply for visas.

Our first family of three arrived on Tuesday 5th April, they are

well and comfortable. Listening to their story has highlighted to me how similar their lives were to ours and how devastatingly quickly that 'normal' life has been destroyed. They want to return home, they did not want to leave in the first place.

Since the start of April we have welcomed several more families to our villages. We had our first fundraising event on Easter Monday, a fabulous easter egg hunt and sunflower raffle in the stunning gardens at Loosley Dene.

The UK government machine is slow. This has been a gigantic, if frustrating, learning curve for everybody and is certainly unprecedented at such a scale, probably since the Second World War. Everybody is working positively towards a common goal and, as more families arrive from the Ukraine, the process to get them here will become more straightforward. Other challenges are likely to become apparent but, if we work together in our community, they will hopefully be overcome.

We have launched a fundraising campaign, 'solidarity with sunflowers.' All funds raised will be going to support the Ukrainian families in the Chilterns. You can buy your sunflowers on our website, on the fundraising page.

The charity is hoping its local community will support their Farewell Midnight Walk, with walkers joining them to remember loved ones and support their local hospice as they walk the final miles for one last time.



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School in 1892

In 1892 all children walked to school and back. The furthest came from Green Hailey Farm at the top of Kop Hill. Others came from the bottom of Smalldean Lane. Older children escorted the little ones. These are some entries from the head teacher's logbook, Lacey Green School.

"December 9th 1892. Very rough weather. Medical order received to close school for three weeks due to measles.

"January 9th . School opened with only 48 scholars. Many are still ill, and those that are better are kept indoors on account of the cold snowy weather.

"January 19th. Sent a list of names to Mr Bell, of children who are taking advantage of the epidemic to absent themselves from school. January 20th. Snow storms and severe weather. Work as usual."

"February 13th. The mistress has this day received leave of absence for four weeks for confinement. Daisy Dell is filling her place.

February 22nd. A heavy fall of snow caused attendance to be small. Many of the children are still in a weak state resulting from the recent visitation of measles.

"April 21st. The vicar has had a cabinet made for a school museum, for which specimens are being collected by master and children. The children are taking greater pains with their work than formerly and the average attendance is increasing. Two concerts have been given during the winter, with the object of obtaining prizes for children. Average for the week 80."

"May 5th. Half-holiday given for Sunday School tea at the Vicarage. May 8th Half-holiday given for tea at the chapel.

"May 29th. Reopened school. Admitted 10 children from Loosley Row. June 5th. Admitted 5 children from Loosley Row. June 19th. Average for the week 84.

"June 19th. Holiday given for choir excursion. July 3rd. Several children from Loosley Row absent owing to a tea at the chapel there.

"July 7th. Today the first standard started at Loosley Row School. (Infants from 3yrs)

"July 17th. Several children away in the harvest field. July 21st. Attendance has suffered this week on account of the harvest commencing and the wet weather."

Summer is nearly here, spring has certainly sprung People are out and about, doing all sorts of things.

Speed cameras

We have had the MVAS speed indicator units damaged by those wandering about, they have broken the outer casing and stolen the batteries from inside. We are not the only village being victimised, Speen had theirs broken into and Hughenden Parish has had similar done to their units and therefore all the units have been removed and stored until the supplier can come up with suitable vandal proof outer casings.

The cost of just replacing each battery is approx. £350 multiplied by 2 plus delivery and repairs to the casings we are looking at a cost of around £1000.

I wonder if the thieves realise how much these units will cost to repair.

Surprisingly no one saw anything, or at least no one has come forward with dash cam or other forms of camera footage or sightings of vehicles parked up next to the units at odd times.

We are trying to access the tubular strips that span the road width and record an average road speed as well as traffic volume until we have the MVAS units back up and running just to keep us all on our toes and within the speed limits.

These will also help keep the momentum going for the newly formed Community Speedwatch team.

Jubilee

Our residents are to be commended for their organising skills in liaising with the authorities to be able to rehouse some of the Ukraine people that have been devastated by the war. Those who are spearheading the street parties being arranged for the Queens Platinum Jubilee have certainly been out and about organising these projects.

Litter pick

Buckinghamshire Council have also been out and about this week, doing the first cut of the verges around the villages. It really does at the moment, look neat and tidy, and in very good time for the 'litter pick' being arranged by councillor Tim MacGillivray and his band of merry pickers on the 24th April. This will make it so much easier to clear the verges and gullies of the rubbish deposited by those who pass through our village – I am sure it is not our residents!

For those volunteering in the 'Litter Pick' the WI are providing tea and cake in the village hall after their valiant effort – thank you I am sure it will be very much appreciated.

School parking

Buckinghamshire Council and Transport for Bucks have finished putting down the yellow lines in the village and aligning both the school bus stop and the Arriva bus stop to make it safer for children to both board and alight in safety. The double yellow lines past the school toward the national speed limited zone, seem to have done the trick, we have not noticed any cars parked on the dangerous bend, although there seems to be some parents who think it is acceptable to park in the crosshatch zone forcing cars, as in previous times, to overtake in the face of buses and cars coming into the village at 60mph.

Park elsewhere

We would ask these parents to please try and refrain from parking in that area and use the various parking facilities that have been made available to parents, including The Black Horse car park, The Village Hall car park and some residents have come to an agreement and allowed parents to park on their driveways.

It just remains for us to say thank you to the residents and organisations of the village for your efforts in making this village what it is, a very pleasant and peaceful village in the Chilterns for all.

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
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
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It was a real privilege to welcome David Rawlinson to Lacey Green on Saturday 2nd April. David is the national president of the Lawn Tennis Association (LTA), and he was keen to hear about the developments we have made over recent years and our future plans.

No doubt, a significant part of our growth has been down to the recruitment of our coach Dan Smith. Dan has grown the junior programme from around 12 to over 70 children, and David was interested to hear how Dan had transformed the coaching, particularly with his work in local schools.

To encourage the children further, Matt Keene has kindly stepped forward to become our junior competition organiser, arranging friendly matches against local clubs. Our first one is in May, and we hope the children will learn a great deal from the experience and most importantly enjoy playing together as a team.

For children new to tennis, Dan will again be running a LTA Youth Start course during the summer. This is subsidised from the LTA and provides each child with 6 lessons, tennis racket and balls, branded t-shirt and other bits for just £35. Keep a look out on our Facebook page and website for further details as these places go very quickly.

Similarly for adults, we ran a popular Tennis Xpress course from February to April and we will be running another one soon. Tennis Xpress is a fun and social beginner class which teaches all the foundations of the game over 6 lessons. A perfect opportunity to learn a new sport which you can play well into retirement.

Our 4 adult teams play in the local Aylesbury league, and we have had a relatively good season. Mens 1 after a shaky start, finished top and will be promoted to division 6. Mens 2 narrowly missed out on promotion, finishing joint second on points, but with fewer set wins. Our mixed team had a fantastic season and finished top, but unfortunately the ladies team struggled in division 9. However, the ladies have been practising hard and hopefully the summer will bear more fruit.

The plans for the new clubhouse are progressing well and from the six designs the architect drew up, we now have a favoured option which will shortly be going into planning. It has a sleek modern look with grey cement boarding on the outside with plenty of double height glazing looking out to the courts and a small canopy for those rain showers.

We estimate the cost to be some £100K and will require a lot of effort both from members in terms of fundraising and from successful grant applications. Our two car washes which we recently held, raised an amazing £1,200 and a big thank you to everyone who supported us. This brings our clubhouse fund to some £20K with further activities planned for the summer, including a gin & fizz night on Friday 13th May, and our 60th anniversary dinner, band and casino evening on Saturday 2nd July.

As I finish typing this in the departure lounge at Innsbruck, Austria, I'm consoled by the fact that it's not long before our men's tennis trip to the clay courts at La Manga, Spain in June.

Buckinghamshire Council

A year has already passed since the local elections when you as residents of the Ridgeway West Division elected us as your Buckinghamshire Councillors.

As the tragic war continues in Ukraine, Buckinghamshire Council along with key stakeholders, are looking to assist the many refugees who have fled their country to seek shelter in UK.

When the Government asked for the public to volunteer to house these refugees, it was the residents of Buckinghamshire who stepped up to the plate, all 2,500, to be the 2nd highest county in the country.

A new <u>Ukraine Crisis Fund</u> has been set up with our partners Heart of Bucks, which allows people to donate money that will directly help Ukrainian families arriving in Buckinghamshire. This is similar to how we channelled donations to Afghan families who've also arrived here.

The funds have helped us to provide all they need to set up a new life in the county. In the same way, money raised through the Ukraine Crisis Fund will go directly towards helping these people who've fled their homes and arrived here in Bucks.

Homes for Ukraine Visa Scheme

The scheme we are currently supporting is the 'Homes for Ukraine' visa scheme. This is where Ukrainian families can apply for a visa if they have a sponsor, such as a family or charity wishing to offer safe and secure accommodation for at least six months. In this first phase of the scheme, sponsors need the name of a Ukrainian individual or family to fill in the visa application.

People who would like to become sponsors, but do not have a link to a Ukrainian family can still <u>register their interest</u> in sponsoring a family. The Council plays no part in matching sponsors with Ukrainian families and that is currently being coordinated through charities and other channels.

Once a UK household has made contact with a Ukrainian person or family in need of sponsorship and both parties want to proceed, either can fill in and progress the visa application.

The Homes for Ukraine sponsorship scheme is separate from the UK Family Scheme which enables Ukrainian applicants to join family members in the UK – further details about this scheme are on the Government's website.



School parking

The parking restrictions are now in place on Main Road close to St John's School, which will make the road safer for both motorists and for the children.

It has been reported that speeding is an issue which will require addressing. There are plans for a Community Speedwatch campaign and we are looking to the North West Chilterns Community Board to seek funding for some speed indicator devices to be able to research what speeds are being experienced.

From Coptic to Celtic

In 2012, I was granted a threemonth Sabbatical by what is now the Diocese of Leeds to undertake a study of the historic relationship between Celtic Christian spirituality in Britain and Ireland, and the spirituality of the "desert heart" of early Coptic Christian monasticism in the wilderness regions of Egypt. As an outcome of this period of Study Leave, I was required to produce a research paper which was published by the Leeds Church Institute.

My travels in the course of my research took me to a variety of places and included a desert pilgrimage, much of it by camel, across the Sinai Peninsular which is that part of Egypt that falls within the continent of Asia. Much the larger area of Egypt is, of course, part of North Africa, with Cairo being the continent of Africa's largest city.

The itinerary for the desert journey I undertook included an overnight stay at Saint Catherine's Monastery, at the foot of Mount Sinai. Saint Catherine's is of the Eastern Orthodox tradition rather than the Coptic tradition of Saint Antony's Monastery which is located in the Red Sea Mountains. Saint Antony was the accredited founder of Christian eremitic monasticism. With a small group from our party, I did ascend to the chapel at the top of Mount Sinai during my time at St. Catherine's, partly by camel as far the Plain of Elijah and the rest on foot.

In mainland Britain, I visited a number of historic Christian sites including the Holy Island of Lindisfarne in Northumbria. I spent a night there alone on the North Beach and was greeted at first light by a solitary seal swimming close to the shoreline!

I also visited the Celtic sites of Lastingham in East Yorkshire; Iona, Whithorn and Orkney in Scotland; as well as Caldey Island in Wales which is associated with a renowned Welsh holy man, Saint Samson.

An organised tour of the great spiritual places of Ireland took me to Newgrange and other Neolithic sites of the Boyne Valley: to the Hill of Tara where Saint Patrick is said to have lit an Easter fire to challenge and confront the pagan Druids; to the Retreat House of the Sisters of Saint Bridget in Kildare; to places associated with the life of Saint Brendan the Navigator who crossed the Atlantic Ocean as if it were desert; to the ancient Celtic monastic sites of Glendalough, Cashel, and Clonmacnoise; and to the monastic ruins on the remote island of Skellig Michael which featured in the most recent Star Wars movie trilogy in the guise of an ancient Jedi holy place!

I did also correspond with the Coptic priest at the "Church of the Seven Coptic Monks" established by the Egyptian Church in modern times in Galway. According to both Coptic and Irish sources, Galway and the Aran Islands are where seven Egyptian missionary monks are said to have introduced Christianity to Ireland long before the coming of Saint Patrick. They are believed to have been buried at Dundesert near the village of Crumlin to the North of Belfast.

In fact, as I was told by a Coptic guide during my time in Sinai, it is in the annals of the Egyptian Church that the Celtic Church is the "daughter" of the Coptic Church.

There are then, common features of the spirituality of the Coptic monks of Egypt and of the Celtic monks of the British Isles, in what is misleadingly

labelled as the Dark Ages", which do resonate with many of our contemporary concerns.

These include, firstly, an innate affinity with nature and the created order which speaks powerfully to our modern-day determination to address environmental and ecological issues.

Secondly, there is the practice of a rule of life and a prayerful withdrawal to quiet and lonely places which address our need for relief from the stresses and tensions of modern-day living.

Thirdly, there is, certainly within the Celtic tradition, a long-standing emphasis on gender equality depicted in some strong female figures in positions of leadership and authority; including, for example, Saint Hilda of Whitby and Saint Ethelburga of Barking, who both presided over double monasteries of women and men; and Saint Brigid of Kildare who tradition tells us was consecrated as a Bishop in the late 5th Century.

Overall, in the course of my studies, I did find merit in those sources which have described the development of early Celtic Christian spirituality in the British Isles as a rich blend of the Desert monastic tradition and Celtic pre-Christian nature religion. I do believe that this is indeed a spiritual tradition which continues to have the power to speak very persuasively to those people in our world who are engaged in the search for deeper meaning and purpose in life.
