

All our residents know the Lacev Green Windmill and many visit regularly. However we have another, less obvious, famous site in walking distance of Lacey Green - the Horse Trust in Slad Lane. I've not visited for many years so I thought it was high time to put that right, so on a lovely sunny afternoon I met with one of the directors, Jessica Tallman, who showed me around.

The Trust look after up to 140 equine residents on the site at any one time. 70% of these are O retired service horses who have finished their working life and are now enjoying a relaxed life in the country. Many of these are gentle giants who have come from the military or police backgrounds, 

though there is a sprinkling of horses from other walks of life, such as retirees from the Riding For The Disabled. At the other end of the size scale there are a couple of donkeys and many Shetland Ponies - who are a great hit with the kids - visitors can even groom the ponies on some Sundays.

Sadly the other 30% of residents come from less happy backgrounds and have been rescued from awful condition and have been taken in by the Trust for respite and recovery. The Trust has 50 staff including in-house vets and equine behaviour professionals to help recovery.

The site has developed over the 50 years it has been in Speen and now has beautiful grounds, exercise and display areas, stables, museum and the allimportant tea room in a beautiful listed barn. The site is open in the afternoons of Thursday to Sunday. You need to buy a ticket online in advance so check the website for details. It is a lovely place to take any visitors you may have this summer.

On Sunday June 30 the Trust will be holding their "Horses, Hounds and Heroes" event. There will be horse riding displays by the Cavalry and the Met Police, with side shows, live music, food stalls, and even a dog show. Do go along and support their work.

### Easter at St John's



Our Palm Sunday service began with the Liturgy of the Palms in the Vicarage grounds followed by a solemn procession into Church in commemoration of Christ's triumphant entry into Jerusalem for the final week of his earthly ministry.

Then followed the Liturgy of the Passion in which the sermon spot was devoted to a reading by three voices of the Passion of the Church according to Saint Mark.

Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday services in Holy Week took the form of the ancient Office of Compline together with a seasonal hymn and choir anthem. On the morning of Maundy Thursday, the Čhurch hosted the respective end-ofterm services for Speen C of E First School and St. John's C of E Academy. Our evening Church

service took the form of the Eucharist of the Last Supper followed by the Stripping of the Altar. On Good Friday afternoon the service was based on readings, anthems and hymns from the Royal School of Church Music publication "The Cross of Christ".

It is a long-standing tradition at St. John's Church that, after the Good Friday service we make our way outside for Good Friday prayers at the foot of the large wooden outdoor cross on the corner of Church Lane and Main Road.

On Easter morn, at 6,15am, a few of us joined a congregation of over fifty people from a variety of churches in the Princes Risborough area for the Churches Together in Risborough Easter sunrise service.

At around the same time the large wooden outdoor cross was being decorated with daffodils, which is another long-standing St. John's Easter season custom.

The ancient Easter ceremonies were incorporated into our 8am service and, at the commencement of our 10am Easter service, we were led by

### **D-Day Landing Anniversary**

To commemorate this important event in our country's history, the Lacey Green and Loosley Row Parish Council are planning and working on a special project with both St. John's Church of England Primary School and St. John's Parish Church.

The school will be holding a D-Day 80 year anniversary theme day on Monday 3rd June, when each class of pupils will work on either an art, drama or writing project, with a D-Day theme appropriate to their age.

On Thursday 6th June, the school will host an exhibition to parents, displaying some of the work prepared on the Monday.

This is planned to run from 2pm until 4pm. Members of the Parish Council will judge the children's work and the Parish Council are providing prizes to the winning entrant in each age group.

The Lacey Green Local History Group will also have a presence at the exhibition by displaying a selection of local photographs and perhaps some artefacts of Lacey Green and Loosley Row

There's a Hole in my Garden, Dear Tony,.....

It was in the early hours of 20th February, and following several days of very heavy rain, that it was discovered that a large hole had opened up in the Vicarage Garden just behind the garage.

In fact, it was the family dog Murphy who first found the hole when he was let out for a morning constitutional at around 5.30am just before dawn; then disappearing behind the garage.



Did you know that the church has a box for One Can donations by the entrance.

Right now, vulnerable families and individuals living locally need your support more than ever. Demand is at the highest levels we've ever seen and with the continuing cost of living crisis, we fear it'll rise further. At present they are asking for:

**Tinned meat meals** Peanut butter and honey Tinned ham & corned beef (low salt) Cooking oil (e.g. olive oil, 500ml) Tinned fish (especially oily fish) Cooking & pasta sauces UHT milk **Tinned** soup **Tinned potatoes and vegetables** Toilet roll **Tinned** fruit Toothpaste / shower gel / deodorant Tea / instant coffee Tampons Healthy cereals (Weetabix or oats) Nappies (sizes 5, 6, 7, 8 only)



The hole measured around five feet deep and five feet across; and finding the hole in the way that he did left Murphy with something of a sore back for quite a few days afterwards.

Recovering him from the mud at the bottom of the hole required a ladder and it was no wonder that he then ran back into the house

at top speed.

Investigations by a geologist concluded that the hole may well have been a sinkhole but more likely the outcome of the collapse of an old disused well.

> The prescribed solution was to fill

the hole with gravel so that it would continue to be porous. Meanwhile the garage was emptied just in case the hole suddenly became significantly bigger.

The hole was duly filled by way of one-ton bags of gravel - ten bags in fact. This remedial action took place on 27th March. Further geological investigations are planned in order to establish whether or not there is a possibility that the hole might again open up further down. The plan is then to add a laver of topsoil over the pit of gravel and to bring the garage back into use.

It is hard to believe that as I write this we are almost at the end of another academic year. Currently the Year 6 pupils are sitting their SATs. Reflecting back, I am proud of the achievements of our pupils and staff which have contributed to another successful vear.

The Autumn Term was full of promise as we welcomed our new Reception intake for the very first time, as well as welcoming pupils from Speen to begin their KS2 education with us. We enjoyed our harvest festival in Church and continue to hold a regular collection for the Wycombe Food Hub. The term culminated in the now famous KS2 pantomime, adding a little fun to the serious business of the telling the story of the Nativity which was expertly delivered by KS1 and Reception.

The Spring term began with Y4,5 and 6 pupils attending the Young Voices Concert in Birmingham. hope that giving the pupils the opportunity to sing as part of a massed choir in a packed arena will inspire some to pursue singing and develop a love of music beyond their time at school.



Our sports teams continued to excel, with the boys winning their football league for the third consecutive season and our netballers again competitive in their matches.

Without the Upper School running sports events, I've been grateful for the contribution by our staff in stepping up to ensure that our pupils are still given the opportunities to represent the school at sport.

Our younger pupils were also successful, winning the inaugural KS1 five-a-side festival. Our girls football team continues to shine, improving with each game and claiming some notable victories.

Our curriculum continues to develop, and pupils have been given additional experiences. Highlights includes Hazard Alley (Y6) to learn about keeping safe and 'citizenship', Y5 have visited Dorset for a 3-day residential, (see photo below) with Year 3/4 attending Verulanium Roman Site. Reception and KS1 have trips planned to College Lake and Wooley Firs Nature reserve.

Our links with the community continue to be as strong as ever with pupils supporting the litter picks and encouraging their own parents to park sensibly and not leave their engines idling - I suspect this message may take longer to sink in but rest assured the message continues to be shared!

### **Meet your councillors**



A couple of weeks before Easter our councillors held a 'surgery' in Lacey Green Village Hall so I went along to meet them. We are in the Ridgeway West ward of Buckinghamshire Council and three councillors have been elected for our ward. They will be running 4 surgeries this year. Today the surgery was being run by Councillor Shade Adoh and Councillor Robert Carington.

They did not hold a surgery in Lacey Green last year and as it was still early in the year, word had not got around as much as they would like and very few residents attended. We agreed that more publicity will be needed for the next meeting in Lacey Green at the end of November. I was told that though they are happy to discuss any topic, people come to the face to face meetings to discuss the more complex and delicate issues.

Each councillor has specific responsibilities within the Council. Councillor Adoh speaks on equality and diversity. She is also on the Council's select committee for adult and social care and the select committee for children and education. She also sits on the Fire Authority executive. Councillor Carington is Vice Chairman of the Transport, Environment and Climate select committee as well as sits on the Audit and Governance Select Committee and the Standards Committees. Both of them have full time jobs outside the council and both have families to look after. They must have very full diaries!

Councillor Adoh has been a councillor since 2015 and has been through the merger of the old District and County Councils into the unitary authority.We discussed projects that the councillors have worked on in our ward.

They talked about the role of the North West Chiltern Community Board and the funding it can bring to local charities and good causes. If you look at their website you can find some examples of local projects that they have carried out.

If you are associated with a local organisation who are trying to raise money then the Community Board should be one of your first contacts. They can provide grants of up to  $\pounds$ 1,000 for small projects, or contributory funding of up to  $\pounds$ 15,000 for larger projects.

### **Taking Care of our Landscape**



Linnet

The linnet is a small finch of scrub and farmland that feeds on seeds. Linnet males have brown backs, grey heads, and pink foreheads and chests. Females are paler and streaky. In winter, they may form large flocks with other seed-eating birds.



### **Corn Bunting**

The corn bunting is a sparrowsized, streaky brown bird with a thick bill. It can be found in hedgerows and on farmland, feeding on seeds and insects. Look for male corn buntings singing from the top of bushes although it sounds just like a set of jangling keys!

The Chilterns National Landscape is a living, working landscape, which has been shaped by people for centuries nearly two-thirds of the Chilterns is farmland and over one-fifth is wooded.

Chilterns National Landscape hosts a major partnership project in the Central Chilterns that concentrates on connecting people to their local landscape, enhancing and protecting wildlife and heritage, and encouraging volunteering.

Chalk, Cherries and Chairs is an ambitious Landscape Partnership Scheme, primarily funded by the National Lottery Heritage Fund. Amongst many other activities, Chalk, Cherries and Chairs encourages farmers and landowners to work together to aid nature's recovery across boundaries.

We support the Central Chilterns Farmer Cluster which helps farmers to understand the wildlife and habitats on their land and link their conservation efforts with those of other local farmers. The Cluster includes Stocken Farm in Lacey Green. Our volunteers have been surveying birds on three farms within the Cluster as part of a wider project to build a picture of our local wildlife.

This has been coupled with the installation of around 80 owl boxes and supporting farmers with winter supplementary bird food over the last five winters, which has been a massive boost for farmland bird numbers.

Thanks to these efforts, if you take a walk around Stocken Farm today, you might spot traditional farmland species like corn bunting, yellowhammer, linnet, chaffinch and skylark - just some of the birds that have been counted among the 72 species recorded in the area by the Chalk, Cherries and Chairs Scheme.

A typical bird of farmland and grassland, look out for male skylarks rising above the grasses and crops to sing their famous songs. These complex songflights can last for up to an hour! Skylarks are not showy in their plumage, however, with a streaky brown body and a crest.



### Yellowhammer

Yellowhammers perch on top of bushes singing – their song follows the rhythm, 'a little bit of bread and no cheese'. They favour woodland edges, hedgerows and farmland, and feed on seeds and insects.

The male vellowhammer is a small, bright yellow bird with a streaky brown back. Females are streaky brown.





### The New Tree for the **Millennium Hall**


If you have visited the hall recently you might have noticed a new tub with a young tree in it sitting in the centre of the outside seating area. This tree was bought by the Loosley Row and Lacey Green Horticultural Society and we hope it will grace the entrance for a good few years to come.

The tree is Sorbus Cashmiriana. It is a rowan, but as the name suggests, it originates from the Western Himalayas, including the Kashmir Region of Northern India.

It was selected because it doesn't grow to more than 20 feet and has several decorative qualities. In the spring it has white blossom tinged with pink. The leaf petioles (stalks) are red in colour and the leaves a soft greyish green. When the berries ripen they are white rather than orange or red like our native rowan trees. These persist for a reasonable time into the winter after the leaves have fallen.

The tree will be underplanted with bedding and bulbs, so that we maintain some interest at a lower level as well!



#### The Windmill WI

There is now a fairly large History Archive from our work over the years, which is housed in a locked metal cabinet in the Village Hall. Our hope is that this will be available for any villager who would like to take up history research in the future.

We hope that this is not the end, and will continue to help whenever we can.

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#### The extremely wet winter weather is still having its effect on farmers in the region. On average we have had an inch of rain per week since mid-October. With breaks in the weather allowing frantic periods of work to get overdue tasks done. Spring cereals were planted later than most would have liked for optimal yields, these crops replacing the planned autumn planted crops that never got planted or failed to get established. Our maize has been planted in mid-May when we are usually aiming for the last week of April, this will push the harvest date back a bit. But good planting conditions should allow the crop to get off to a good start.

The cows have been turned out a month later as we waited for the grazing fields to dry enough not to be instantly churned up by their feet. We operate a hybrid system where the cows have top up feed indoors and also graze so we are more flexible.

There are many farmers, more to the west of the U.K. that rely on grass only in the spring. With the cold wet weather in March and April these cows have not milked well, which has reduced the U.K.'s spring flush of milk. This is when the country peaks in milk production, and the milk price is often reduced. In the middle of May the U.K. were producing 44.13 million litres of milk per day which is 903,000 litres less per day than last year, 2.4% down on long term average.

Arla announced this spring it is planning a new cheese plant in Devon, making mozzarella. Cheese making helps with the spring flush. Milk supply is finely balanced. The USA is 1% down in milk production which will probably lead to milk prices rising later this year.

Winter crops of wheat do not look good here, but also across Northern Europe and Russia (a major exporter) which will result in a smaller 2024 harvest and putting pressure on wheat prices, something we will probably notice in food prices next year.



We did the first cut of grass for silage on 20th April, hopefully 2nd cut will be around a month later. If we can cut the grass before it goes to seed, the silage we make will be high in protein and highly digestible so the cows produce more milk from it, hopefully resulting in us needing to feed less of the expensive concentrates. See the photo above for a red kite's view of silaging and the photo below of grass being picked up in a field called 'Wathams'. (if you walk the footpath between Westlands and Church Lane you will recognise it).



The picture below shows maize being planted in a field we call 'Moseley' in Naphill. Maize seed has got very expensive, now costing towards £100 acre, so you can't afford to make mistakes, or plant it in the wrong conditions.





On a positive note our herd has now been declared free of Bovine Tuberculosis (TB). We have tested all the cows 5 times in the last year, some have been culled but we have now had 2 clear tests, so a big relief.

However we are a closed herd, which means we do not buy cows in, so the initial TB infection probably came from infected wildlife in the area, making it highly likely to return. We try to mitigate against this but, with cattle now going out to graze, it becomes very difficult.

Construction has started of our new grain store. Hopefully this will be ready for this year's harvest. Our old grain barn is over 40 years old, it has been a subject of conversation during our Red Tractor Audits and is no longer really fit for purpose. The walls, being made of metal, are becoming weak with fatigue and the roof is not high enough to tip modern trailers so its replacement should be a big improvement. It will also be easier to clean and so keep insect and rodent free.

We will soon be planting up some areas to be left for nature as part of our Mid-Tier Agreement. These are field corners and less productive areas of the farm. We are planting 3 plots of nectar flowers and several areas to provide bird food next winter, that should provide food in the hungry months for various farmland birds. See p18.

We have some hedge planting planned in for next near. We have done the first bird survey this spring, still with good numbers recorded despite not being the kindest of weather on the day. We will be doing another one shortly and a butterfly survey is being conducted throughout the summer so lots of things arehappening!

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### Fitness can be fun



The media feeds us a string of messages about how we should take more exercise and become fitter. Many of us have joined a gym in the past and have had the lonely experience of battling away on exercise machines getting utterly bored. Doing it on your own can be very dispiriting and it's hard to find the motivation to keep going.

The alternative is to go to group classes. These are much more social and if you've got a good group leader can be lots of fun. The exercises and movements vary each time so it's not so boring, and you can make new friends after the class and get support from them. However it can be difficult to find a class that fits in with your schedule and needs. Also the cost can build up, classes normally cost around £11 per session and the experts recommend that we do at least two sessions per week to maintain our fitness.

Following a recommendation from a Hallmark reader I visited the Prestwood Gym & Fitness Centre and met with Luke Askew, the Manager. The centre is only 10 minutes drive from Lacey Green and is open from dawn till late 7 days a week. Luke explained to me that he is trying to set up a hybrid model where they have a fully equipped gym for those who want to use the machines but also have a wide range of classes with multiple classes every day.

His target audience is Seniors and many of the weekday classes are tailored for older people and a slower pace; though the gym does put on basic strength courses where an experienced trainer leads a small group through a range of exercises on the machines.

Most classes take place in the purpose built studio. These include Tai Chi, Pilates, Yoga, Aerobics, and Zumba. The good news is that once you have paid the membership fee, (less than £10 per week) all the classes are free, and you can go as often as you wish.

The gym staff are all mature adults trained and qualified to assist members, many of them have been at the centre for over 10 years. One of them is qualified to work with members who have been referred to the centre by their GP for specific remedial or recovery exercises, and the others are

qualified personal trainers.

The centre is a charity community facility not a commercial organisation. The land is owned by the Prestwood Sports & Leisure Association, and the centre is run by a not-forprofit charitable organisation who also run many other leisure centres. The team pride themselves on supporting the local community and get involved with charitable events based at the centre.

There are no long contracts, just 30 days notice, so give it a try and see if it suits you.

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About 10 years ago after bumping into a chap I used to work with, who suggested I came over to look at Workaid in Chesham to see what they were doing. I signed up as a volunteer for one afternoon a week.

The aim of Workaid is to provide tools and equipment for vocational projects in Africa. To teach young people skills and to empower them to make a sustainable living or set up their own small businesses. Projects may include woodworking, tailoring and sewing, plumbing, engineering and vehicle maintenance.

The tools are all donated to Workaid by the public who have a shed or workshop to clear out, moving house or following a bereavement. Everything from woodworking tools, hand tools through to sewing machines, knitting machines and haberdashery. Equipment is then cleaned and serviced, packed in relevant kits, loaded into containers and exported to Africa where local agents supervise the allocation.

Any surplus or non-suitable equipment is sold either through our "Charity shop with a difference" or on eBay to raise funds to pay for the containers and workshop running costs.

I volunteer in the "heavy" machine workshop where we service and repair larger machines such as woodworking and engineering machines, compressors, air tools etc. I also do maintenance and safety on the charity's own workshop machinery.

I work with an amazing bunch of people who have worked in different industries and have retired but have so much experience and skills to offer. We also have a Duke of Edinburgh award volunteer. Not only do I feel a huge satisfaction doing a great job training people in Africa but I've made some really good friends there.



Volunteers are welcome from all the community, retired people from every discipline who have something to offer, skilled or unskilled, people with learning difficulties or recovering from illness or injuries. There are two shifts a day and the charity even provide free tea and biscuits!
